They're doing it because it has nothing to do

don't care if the county raises their limit to 35
for buying, as long as we sting for 18 or under.

The argument that's been given - and you know I'm not trajecting this at you but I just want it on the record.

LEGISLATOR JACOBS: The argument that has been given by the commissioner of health here and the attorney here that the ATUPA money will be in jeopardy, I've cleared that up on my own, just by knowing, obviously, that Suffolk and New York City both have Tobacco 21. Now there are two or three other counties in the Westchester area that have gone to Tobacco 21, including states,

I've been living, eating, and breathing these tobacco laws from when I first started as a legislator. The reason is they have found there is actually certified, you know, reports that if you can catch a young person from starting smoking before they are 21 the chances of their becoming addicted are lowered by a tremendous percentage. So the truth of the matter is I do not know. Mary Ellen, you know me well enough. I'm not talking to you but I want the record to show I don't know what our Health Department is thinking of because - of course I'm going to vote for this today. We have to do this. But the bottom line is how could we be going against what the federal government has already recognized as a fact, not even a though, a fact.

MS. LAURAIN: We can't legislate. But I have talked to Dr. Eisenstein at length and he is quite aware that our ATUPA money wouldn't be jeopardized and I believe he even wrote a letter

I've been reading that the E-cigarettes are exploding and that people are being harmed. I would like to make sure that we expand in our educational endeavors, that we speak to that.
