2 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: We are going to
3 start the Public Safety Committee. Mr.
4 Pulitzer, would you call the roll for the
5 Public Safety Committee?

6 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator Siela
7 Bynoe?

8 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Here.

9 CLERK PULITZER: Minority Leader
10 Kevan Abrahams?

11 LEGISLATOR ABRAHAMS: Here.

12 CLERK PULITZER: Ranking Member
13 Legislator Curran?

14 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Here.

15 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator
16 Denise Ford?

17 LEGISLATOR FORD: Here.

18 CLERK PULITZER: Legislator
19 Vincent Muscarella?

20 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Here.

21 CLERK PULITZER: Vice Chairman
22 Donald MacKenzie?

23 LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: Here.

24 CLERK PULITZER: Chairman Dennis
25 Dunne?

2 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Here.

3 CLERK PULITZER: We have a
4 quorum, sir.

5 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: The first item
6 to come before this committee is Item
7 508-16. It's an ordinance supplemental to
8 the annual appropriation ordinance in
9 connection with the Nassau County Department
10 of Probation.

11 We also have in the addendum two
12 items for the same department. So I'm going
13 to ask for a motion to suspend the rules.

14 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.

15 LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: Second.

16 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Denise
17 Ford, seconded by Donald MacKenzie.

18 All in favor?

19 (Aye.)

20 It passes. Rules are suspended.
21 That will include, while we have the
22 Probation Department here, Item 546-16, an
23 ordinance supplemental to the annual
24 appropriation ordinance in connection with
25 Department of Probation;

2 And Item 548, which also is an
3 ordinance supplemental to the annual
4 appropriation ordinance in connection with
5 the Nassau County Department of Probation.

6 So we will go over the first one
7 and who do we have?

8 LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: So moved.

9 LEGISLATOR FORD: Second.

10 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Donald
11 MacKenzie, seconded by Denise Ford. And we
12 have?

13 MR. LANCEMAN: Good afternoon,
14 Doug Lanceman, Probation.

15 I'm going to speak on 508-16.
16 This grant is for supervision and treatment
17 services for juveniles program. It's funded
18 by New York State OCFS. This grant has been
19 renewed in the past five years.

20 This particular grant is a
21 transitional grant from April through
22 September of this year. We get 62 percent
23 reimbursement on this grant, and 38 percent
24 is local share.

25 The total grant is \$170,683. We

2 get a net of \$105,823 on that grant.

3 The program focuses on juvenile
4 reform by assessing the risk levels and then
5 matching that risk to the proper level of
6 intervention needed by juveniles. The
7 targeted population of youth are juvenile
8 delinquents and youth adjudicated to be
9 persons in New York supervision which of
10 PINS.

11 Finally, Nassau was proudly
12 selected, Nassau Probation, was proudly
13 selected as one of six pilot counties in New
14 York State to hire a juvenile detention
15 alternative's coordinator, and that person
16 will collect, analyze, monitor county level
17 data regarding juvenile justice processes
18 and population of youth in JDC system.

19 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: The juvenile
20 detention center sits right in my district
21 and I appreciate this program. But it was
22 mentioned earlier today that this was from
23 April to September of this year; is that
24 correct?

25 MR. LANCEMAN: That's correct.

2 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Is there a
3 reason why it came to us so late?

4 MR. LANCEMAN: Yes.
5 Traditionally OCFS seems to send out their
6 grants quite late. We received the approval
7 later, at the end of August.

8 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Wow. Okay. On
9 this item, all in favor indicate by saying
10 aye. Any questions? Legislator Curran,
11 please.

12 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Hello. So
13 you say that this grant has been renewed for
14 how many years?

15 MR. LANCEMAN: This grant has
16 been renewed for five years.

17 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: So, I'm
18 wondering, would it make sense to not
19 develop the same expertise in-house so we
20 don't need to contract it out, since we keep
21 renewing it?

22 MR. LANCEMAN: Actually, this
23 grant is being handled by an outside
24 contractor, Family and Children's Services.
25 They take care of all of the work with the

2 grant and they have done a very successful
3 job for us, and the state is very happy with
4 them.

5 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Does this
6 contract come before the Legislature?

7 MR. LANCEMAN: The contract
8 itself, yes.

9 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: It does.
10 Okay. Thank you.

11 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Legislator
12 Bynoe, did you have a question?

13 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you. I
14 have a question about the performance under
15 this grant.

16 So you said that the state is
17 happy with the services that are being
18 provided by Children and Family Services.

19 I guess my question is, what are
20 the objectives, what are the performance
21 indicators, and how are they achieving them?
22 What is the intended outcome of this? Are
23 we doing any data analysis to determine
24 whether we actually are achieving the goals
25 of the program

2 MR. LANCEMAN: Well, I'm the
3 financial person for the department, not the
4 program. But I do have some information I
5 can share with you.

6 We treat about 40 youths per year
7 in this program. As I said, the idea of the
8 program is to make sure that we defer people
9 from going into the program itself into the
10 wider detention services program.

11 So if we can divert youth from
12 going into the programs that are going to
13 cost a lot more, this program is very, very
14 valuable.

15 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: You say we
16 target 40 youths and some of them are
17 persons in need of supervision, PINS and the
18 like. So it's 40 youth. Have we determined
19 whether 50 percent of them are successful
20 for not having to go into probation or to be
21 later remanded to the juvenile detention
22 center? That's the kind of data I'm looking
23 for, or are all 100 percent of them
24 successful in not falling into a juvenile
25 delinquent scenario?

2 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: You received an
3 award, so you had to have done a report to
4 get that award, so if you could forward it,
5 a copy of that report, maybe that would
6 answer some of your questions, help out.

7 MR. LANCEMAN: We can get
8 additional data on that grant to support
9 this. If that's all right, we can get back
10 to you?

11 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: That would be
12 great.

13 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any legislators
14 have any other questions?

15 (No verbal response.)

16 Is there any public comment?

17 (No verbal response.)

18 There being none, all those in
19 favor indicate by saying aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 Any against?

22 (No verbal response.)

23 Passes unanimously.

24 We are going to 546-16, are you
25 going to be covering 546-16 also?

2 MR. LANCEMAN: Yes. 546-16 is
3 our annual request for supplemental for our
4 DWI grant which is funded through Traffic
5 Safety Board. The amount of the
6 supplemental is \$235,000. Traffic Safety
7 Board supports monthly victim impact panels,
8 field operations, including surveillance of
9 DWI offenders, suspected of driving without
10 licenses and/or ignition interlocks, and the
11 use of cutting edge scam devices to help
12 monitor high risk offenders and we're about
13 10 abstinence.

14 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Did you say it
15 funds both victims and offenders?

16 MR. LANCEMAN: This grant will
17 support monitoring offenders, yes.

18 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any legislators
19 have any questions?

20 (No verbal response.)

21 Is there any public comment?

22 (No verbal response.)

23 There being none, all those in
24 favor indicate by saying aye.

25 (Aye.)

2 Wait, wait. Ms. Mereday.

3 MS. MEREDAY: Meta J. Mereday,
4 Baldwin. I'm just again piggybacking on
5 Legislator Bynoe's question about some
6 indicators and some benchmarks with regard
7 to the amount of monies that's being
8 incorporated into this grant.

9 Like, what are the overall
10 objectives as it pertains to what this grant
11 is about? I know generally we're talking
12 about kind of stop DWI. But, clearly, even
13 with all the hoopla and T shirts and
14 promotions we're not stopping it.

15 How is this program for this
16 amount of money doing anything different
17 that we can say from let's say 2015, 2016?
18 We have addressed it. We've done something
19 different that is positively impactful.
20 That's my question.

21 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: I don't think
22 you'll ever stop it but do you have that
23 kind of information, the difference in the
24 years as it progressively went forward?

25 MR. LANCEMAN: I can't comment on

2 that, I don't have it in front of me.

3 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: If you get it
4 you can submit it to us. Legislator Ford
5 has a follow-up.

6 LEGISLATOR FORD: My comment then
7 would be, I would think that you're not in
8 preventing DWI, but as a matter of people
9 who are convicted of drunk driving, they
10 need to have that piece of equipment placed
11 in their car.

12 MR. LANCEMAN: Right. Scrams.

13 LEGISLATOR FORD: So that they
14 would have to blow into it before so that
15 the engine would start, right?

16 MR. LANCEMAN: Yes.

17 LEGISLATOR FORD: So what it is,
18 once a person -- you're responsibility would
19 be that once a person has been convicted of
20 drunk driving, then you would then install
21 it and monitor it and every month you would
22 collect the data from that to make sure that
23 that person is adhering to the law so that
24 they are not drinking and driving and once
25 again on the road committing crimes?

2 MR. LANCEMAN: That's correct.

3 Those scrams are slapped on people's ankles
4 and will monitor exactly what is going on.
5 It will transmit how much alcohol they have
6 been drinking.

7 LEGISLATOR FORD: Have you seen
8 an increase in a number of people having
9 this or has it remained pretty flat?

10 MR. LANCEMAN: Well, we will put
11 scrams on when it's court ordered.

12 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
13 much.

14 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: That's \$235,000.

15 MR. LANCEMAN: Yes, it is. And
16 it comes from traffic safety.

17 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: So that's the
18 monetary part you asked about also.
19 Legislator Bynoe.

20 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: To
21 Ms. Mereday's question. I think that there
22 might be some usefulness in getting some
23 data around, how many of those individuals
24 are, I guess, found to have broken their
25 agreement with the state court, in essence,

2 they actually get caught a second time,
3 re-offended. So I do think there's some
4 ability to get some data from that.

5 MR. LANCEMAN: Yes.

6 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: And I also
7 have a question regarding who the vendor is.

8 MR. LANCEMAN: I believe there
9 are several interlock vendors that's used.
10 I'm not sure of all the names. I think one
11 is Smart Start. I'm not sure of the other
12 vendor.

13 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Could you
14 provide this body the names of all of the
15 entities that are currently being utilized?

16 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Sure. If you
17 submit it to the chair, I will make sure all
18 of the members of the committee get a copy
19 of it. That would be great.

20 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you.

21 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any other
22 legislators?

23 (No verbal response.)

24 Is there any public comment?

25 (No verbal response.)

2 There being none, all those in
3 favor indicate by saying aye.

4 (Aye.)

5 Any against?

6 (No verbal response.)

7 Passes unanimously.

8 And the third item you had is
9 548-16 which is?

10 MR. LANCEMAN: Thank you. It's
11 the same item for Number 508-16. This
12 particular one, 548-16, is a one year grant.
13 It's the same situation for the supervision
14 and treatment services for juveniles
15 program.

16 Except this particular one will
17 run a period of October 1st of '16 through
18 September of '17. The amount of money is
19 almost identical. It's simply doubled up
20 because it's a one year period.

21 The gross amount would be
22 \$341,104. Netted out, it's 62 percent,
23 comes to \$211,045, and again it's a 38
24 percent local share.

25 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any comments

1 Public Safety Committee/11-7-16

2 from any of the legislators?

3 (No verbal response.)

4 Is there any public comment?

5 (No verbal response.)

6 There being none, all those in
7 favor indicate by saying aye.

8 (Aye.)

9 Any against?

10 (No verbal response.)

11 Passes unanimously. Thank you so
12 much.

13 MR. LANCEMAN: Thank you.

14 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: The next item
15 that comes before us, back on the regular
16 calendar, and it's Item 509-16, an ordinance
17 supplemental to the annual appropriation
18 ordinance in connection with the Medical
19 Examiner's Office.

20 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.

21 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Second.

22 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
23 Legislator Ford, seconded by Legislator
24 Muscarella. Who do we have to speak today?

25 MR. HAHN: Timothy Hahn,

1 Public Safety Committee/11-7-16
2 Assistant Director of the Medical Examiner's
3 Office Tox Lab. This is a grant in the
4 amount of \$47,000 from New York State
5 Governor's Traffic Safety Committee.

6 It's used to support alcohol and
7 drug tests in suspected DWI cases.

8 The funds are applied for work
9 performed on an overtime basis or for
10 supplies that are needed for that analysis.

11 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: We do that here
12 now and back in Nassau County, we don't have
13 to send away for that?

14 MR. HAHN: This was never sent
15 out. This was always kept in-house. At
16 least the alcohol testing, the drug testing
17 is now in-house. It has been for a number
18 of years.

19 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent. Any
20 questions? Legislator Curran.

21 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Hi. So it
22 appears that these grants are going towards
23 the salaries of two employees who are
24 already on the payroll, right?

25 MR. HAHN: That's correct.

2 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: So this is
3 just basically supplementing their salary?

4 MR. HAHN: For work performed on
5 an overtime basis.

6 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: For work
7 performed on an overtime basis. That makes
8 sense. Thank you.

9 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any other
10 questions?

11 (No verbal response.)

12 Is there any public comment?

13 (No verbal response.)

14 There being none, all those in
15 favor indicate by saying aye.

16 (Aye.)

17 Any against?

18 (No verbal response.)

19 It passes unanimously. Thank you
20 so much, Mr. Hahn.

21 The next item to come before us,
22 take two items, 511-16 and 518-16, they're
23 both ordinances supplemental to the annual
24 appropriation ordinance in connection with
25 the District Attorney's Office. Motion,

2 please.

3 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.

4 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Second.

5 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Denise
6 Ford, seconded by Vincent Muscarella.

7 Mr. MCMANUS: The item 511 is the
8 Aid to Prosecution Grant program which the
9 District Attorney's Office has received over
10 20 years. The Aid to Prosecution Program
11 utilizes the grant funds to support the
12 prosecution of repeat, violent, and serious
13 felony offenders by maintaining a staff of
14 highly experienced prosecutors who strictly
15 work on those cases in order to achieve
16 convictions and maximum sentences for such
17 defendants.

18 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: That was 511.
19 Extremely important. Any legislators have
20 any questions?

21 (No verbal response.)

22 Is there any public comment?

23 (No verbal response.)

24 There being none, all those in
25 favor indicate by saying aye.

3 Any against?

4 (No verbal response.)

5 Passes seven nothing.

6 Now 518-16.

7 MR. MCMANUS: Yes, 518 is
8 actually three supplemental appropriation
9 requests combined together for a total of
10 approximately \$1.96 million. This funding
11 is awarded to the District Attorney's Office
12 by the state as forfeiture proceeds due to
13 our involvement in various criminal
14 investigations and prosecutions.

15 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Very
16 interesting. Any comments from any of the
17 legislators?

18 (No verbal response.)

19 Any public comment?

20 Yes, there is. Ms. Mereday.

21 MS. MEREDAY: Yes, I'm just
22 curious where this funding is actually going
23 to be placed. There was a concern that I
24 had expressed to this body a number of
25 months ago with regard to what was taking

2 place with the veterans court in Nassau
3 County, and I didn't get to receive any
4 information or follow-up as it pertains to
5 that, in terms of providing a location that
6 would give our veterans that sensitivity and
7 support when they act outside the law;
8 specifically as it pertains to DWI and DUI
9 offenses as well as domestic violence
10 scenarios due to their conditions from
11 service.

12 I'm just, again, posing the
13 question and the concern and just asking to
14 what operation with this \$1.96 million since
15 it would be within the District Attorney's
16 Office how that funding would be allocated
17 and, again, my recommendation as it pertains
18 to the much needed veterans court in Nassau
19 County. Thank you.

20 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Just quickly, I
21 was with Judge McAndrew earlier this weekend
22 and he is on the veterans court. He said
23 they're doing incredible work. It's 97
24 percent non-recidivism. So there's only
25 three percent of people commit self

2 treatment, or whatever the problem is, that
3 go to court and they're being addressed
4 also.

5 But, as far as the District
6 Attorney not wanting that, I remember in the
7 very beginning, they didn't want DWI to be
8 included.

9 Now, if Mr. McManus would address
10 that for us, that would be wonderful so we
11 all would get to know something about what's
12 going on with the DWIs.

13 MR. MCMANUS: I have no
14 information available about that.

15 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Would you be
16 able to supply that to me and I will get
17 that to my colleagues and maybe we'll make
18 it public.

19 MR. MCMANUS: Certainly.

20 LEGISLATOR FORD: What does the
21 District Attorney do then with the money
22 that's received?

23 MR. MCMANUS: Required by law --
24 the money can only be used for prosecutions
25 and investigations of criminal cases.

2 LEGISLATOR FORD: So it can't be
3 like segmented out so that specifically used
4 for prosecutions of veterans or if they were
5 in to court or anything like that?

6 MR. MCMANUS: I think my sense
7 would be that if this specific area is
8 involved with some type of criminal case --

9 LEGISLATOR FORD: That falls
10 under this. Okay. So you are actually
11 limited as to what you can use the funds
12 for?

13 MR. MCMANUS: Absolutely.

14 LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you.

15 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Yes. The
16 veterans court is to help veterans that self
17 medicate so they don't end up in jail, they
18 end up in an institution, a 28 day program,
19 whatever it might be.

20 MS. MEREDAY: Yes and no if I can
21 just clarify that. A veterans court has a
22 wide range. It really depends on the
23 structure determined by the municipality.
24 So it can take on a wide range of issues.
25 It's just the majority of the offenses that

2 veterans incur are within the DUI and DWI
3 arena. But it provides an opportunity for a
4 more compassionate sort of format so that
5 it's not always just straight to jail for
6 the offense.

7 So it's trying to alleviate the
8 issues of the self medication or the
9 increase in substance abuses that lead to
10 other aspects.

11 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: So does Suffolk
12 County but we have to catch up with the
13 times. We'll continue to be with the
14 District Attorney on that.

15 MS. MEREDAY: Thank you.

16 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any legislators
17 have any other questions? Another question
18 from Laura Curran.

19 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: If I'm
20 understanding this correctly, most of this
21 goes towards contracts; is that correct? To
22 the DE line?

23 MR. MCMANUS: In this particular
24 item, yes, ma'am. Most of it is going to
25 contracts that could include expert

2 witnesses, that could include any number of
3 things where we have to make expenditures to
4 follow a case.

5 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Okay. And
6 these are not the kinds of contracts that
7 would come before the Rules Committee?

8 MR. MCMANUS: No, they don't go
9 through the county purchasing process at
10 all.

11 LEGISLATOR CURRAN: Thank you.

12 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Last question.
13 So, confirmation, all the money stays within
14 the District Attorney's Office for the use
15 of the office to investigate and bring
16 cases?

17 MR. MCMANUS: Yes. We have no
18 choice about that, that's correct.

19 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: It doesn't go
20 into the police department or anything else?

21 MR. MCMANUS: No.

22 LEGISLATOR BYNOE: Thank you.

23 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Any other
24 questions?

25 (No verbal response.)

2 Is there any other public

3 comment?

4 (No verbal response.)

5 All those in favor indicate by

6 saying aye.

7 (Aye.)

8 Any against?

9 (No verbal response.)

10 That's six to nothing.

11 Unanimous. Thank you.

12 The next item is item 529-16, a
13 resolution to authorization the transfer of
14 appropriations heretofore made within the
15 budget for the year of 2016. Motion,
16 please.

17 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.

18 LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: Second.

19 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Denise
20 Ford, seconded by Donald MacKenzie. Who is
21 here to speak on this? Somebody from
22 Traffic and Parking Violations Agency? I
23 believe this was spoken about by Mr. Mistrone
24 in the Rules Committee? No, it wasn't.

25

3 Motion to table.

4 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.

5 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Second.

6 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Denise
7 Ford, seconded by Vincent Muscarella.

8 All those in favor of tabling
9 indicate by saying aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 Any against?

12 (No verbal response.)

13 Six nothing to table.

14 The last item to come before us
15 then is on the addendum calendar and it's
16 545-16, an ordinance supplemental to the
17 annual appropriations ordinance in
18 connection with the Fire Commission.

19 LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: So moved.

20 LEGISLATOR FORD: Second.

21 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Donald
22 MacKenzie, seconded by Denise Ford.
23 Mr. Priest is here.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF PRIEST:

25 Assistant Chief John Priest from the Fire

1 Public Safety Committee/11-7-16
2 Marshal's Office. This is a \$94,000 grant
3 from the Department of Homeland Security and
4 Emergency Services which is targeted for a
5 hazmat equipment and upgrades.

6 The proceeds are shared between
7 the fire marshal, the police department, and
8 four volunteer fire departments that form
9 the hazardous materials response for the
10 county.

11 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Excellent.
12 That's a grant?

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF PRIEST: That is
14 a grant.

15 LEGISLATOR FORD: So moved.

16 LEGISLATOR MACKENZIE: Second.

17 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by Denise
18 Ford, seconded by Donald MacKenzie. Any
