- 7 Clerk. The first item to come before this
- 8 committee is 608-16, an ordinance
- 9 supplemental to the annual appropriation
- 10 ordinance in connection with the Office of
- 11 Management and Budget. We have with us?
- MR. DELANEY: Thomas Delaney,
- 13 Office of Emergency Management.
- 14 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: So moved.
- 15 LEGISLATOR FORD: Second.
- 16 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Motion by
- 17 Vincent Muscarella, seconded by Denise Ford.
- 18 Now the item is with the Office of
- 19 Management and Budget.
- MR. BECKER: Mr. Chairman, you
- 21 might want to call all three items together.
- 22 You want to do all three separate?
- CHAIRMAN DUNNE: We will do it.
- MR. BECKER: They're all kind of
- 25 interrelated. You might want to discuss

- 3 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Good idea, Mr.
- 4 Becker. We will also call Item 609-16, an
- 5 ordinance supplemental to the annual
- 6 appropriations ordinance in connection with
- 7 Emergency Management, Public Works, Health
- 8 and Medical Examiner.
- 9 And Item 610-16, an ordinance
- 10 supplemental to the annual appropriations
- 11 ordinance in connection with the Office of
- 12 Emergency Management. Motion on those.
- 13 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: So moved.
- 14 LEGISLATOR FORD: Second.
- 15 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: Again, the
- 16 motion is by Legislator Muscarella and is
- 17 seconded by Denise Ford.
- MR. DELANEY: I was going to
- 19 suggest that also because there is such a
- 20 similarity between these three you could
- 21 just save time.
- These are three grants that
- 23 Nassau County does not apply for, per se,
- 24 they are not competitive is what I mean.
- They are risked based grants.

- 2 The Department of Homeland Security, through
- 3 FEMA, issues these grants. They are passed
- 4 through New York State Department of
- 5 Homeland Security.
- To describe them all, they are
- 7 all there so that we can prevent, prepare
- 8 for, respond to, and recover from acts of
- 9 terrorism. That is the main purpose of
- 10 these grants is for terrorism.
- 11 They also have an all hazard
- 12 nature to them too, which we said during
- 13 Sandy, we are not immune from all hazard
- 14 events, but terrorism is the main purpose of
- 15 these grants.
- The first one, 608-16, that's our
- 17 UASI or Urban Area Security Initiative
- 18 Grant. We receive that because of our
- 19 proximity to New York City.
- There are I believe about 30 UASI
- 21 cities in the country. New York City
- 22 receiving the large majority of funding like
- 23 double -- I would say even triple of the
- 24 next city down.
- New York City has the highest

- 2 threat level. Being a contingent to New
- 3 York City, we get some of the money, a very
- 4 small portion of it, but we're very happy to
- 5 get anything.
- 6 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: So that's
- 7 \$2,647,000 for the urban area security
- 8 initiative. 609 is?
- 9 MR. DELANEY: That is our State
- 10 Homeland Security Grant Program. That's
- 11 awarded to every county in the state from
- 12 New York State, again, based on risk. So we
- 13 stand alone in our risk profiling in
- 14 receiving that.
- 15 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: That's \$1.4
- 16 million and change.
- 17 MR. DELANEY: Correct.
- 18 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: And 610?
- MR. DELANEY: The last one, 610
- 20 is our Emergency Management Performance
- 21 Grant. That allows us to maintain and
- 22 sustain our emergency operations center. We
- 23 use it for staffing expenses. It is a match
- 24 grant. The other two grants are no match.
- 25 The MPG has a 50 percent cost match

- 2 associated with it. We use it primarily for
- 3 salary fringe, and a small portion of it is
- 4 used for travel expenses for OEM staff to
- 5 attend approved training.
- 6 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: That's half a
- 7 million dollars of a grant that we're
- 8 receiving. Okay. Now are there any
- 9 questions from any legislators about any of
- 10 these three items?
- 11 (No verbal response.)
- 12 Is there any public comment?
- 13 (No verbal response.)
- 14 There being none, all those in
- 15 favor of all three of these items indicate
- 16 by saying aye.
- 17 (Aye.)
- 18 Any against?
- 19 (No verbal response.)
- 20 LEGISLATOR FORD: Motion to
- 21 adjourn.
- 22 LEGISLATOR MUSCARELLA: Second.
- 23 CHAIRMAN DUNNE: There being no
