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
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A Homeowner's Guide to Fire Safety and Prevention

As Fire Prevention Week (October 9th - 15th) draws near, it is incumbent upon homeowners to reevaluate and bolster their fire safety protocols. Every year, domestic fires account for significant property damage, injuries, and sadly, loss of life. Many of these incidents are preventable with the right knowledge and precautionary measures. This article serves as a comprehensive guide to basic fire safety and prevention in the home, ensuring that families are equipped with the tools and knowledge to mitigate the risk of fire.

Understanding Fire Hazards

The first step to fire prevention is identifying potential fire hazards within the home. Common sources include cooking equipment, heating appliances, electrical systems, and smoking materials. Being aware of these sources and handling them with caution drastically reduces the risk of fire.

Fire Prevention Strategies

3. Heating Safety:

Maintain Heating Equipment: Have heaters inspected annually and ensure they are clean and functioning properly.

Keep a Safe Distance: Place anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment.

4. Smoking Safety:

Smoke Outside: Establish and adhere to a strict outdoor smoking policy.

Proper Disposal: Ensure cigarette butts are fully extinguished before disposal.

Fire Safety Equipment

1. Smoke Alarms:

Installation: Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including inside and outside sleeping areas.

Testing: Test alarms monthly and replace batteries annually.

2. Fire Extinguishers:

Accessibility: Keep fire extinguishers accessible, especially in areas like the kitchen.

Training: Ensure family members know how to use extinguishers properly.

3. Escape Ladders:

For multi-story homes, store collapsible escape ladders near windows to facilitate swift evacuation.

Fire Escape Plan

- Draft a Plan: Create a detailed fire escape plan with two exit routes from every room.
- **Practice Regularly:** Conduct biannual fire drills, ensuring every family member is familiar with the escape routes.
- Special Considerations: Consider the needs of elderly or disabled family members and pets.





NEVER USE CANDLES FOR EMERGENCY LIGHTING

Always use flash lights and stock up on extra batteries.



USE FIREPLACE SAFELY

Always use a metal or heat-tempered glass screen when using your fireplace.





Each winter as the cold weather settles in, .any people will start up their heating system for the first time without doing the proper start-up service. Be sure to change filters, vacuum or move any dust, debris or objects that may be in close proximity to a heat source or flame. This is also a great time to clean out or replace your clothes drier lint hose.

Which Fire Extinguisher Should You Choose?



Make sure to choose the correct class of fire extinguisher for the type of material that is burning. There are ABC extinguishers that cover most situations and special K class extinguisher designed for most cooking fires. These minimize splashing of agents such as cooking oils. Do NOT use a water or type A extinguisher on an oil or combustible metal fire.

Check all items that have expiration dates, this includes batteries, over the counter medications and any perishable items. Don't wait, tomorrow maybe the day you and your family will need it.

Our ICS training continued with how to prepared both a Hot Wash and After Action Report. Next month we will put all the year's trainings together with a Table Top Exercise. You will be given an incident scenario and it will be your teams responsibility to populate the necessary forms with the information provided. This type of interactive training is essential and fun too. There will also be an after meeting SkyWarn winter reportable criteria training. The entire country has been going through an unusual weather pattern which has created new problems for many communities. That is why knowing how to read the sky can help keep you safe.

Many of our Amateur Radio Operators have received SkyWarn training with the National Weather Service (NWS). Because of this, we have the ability to report local weather activity giving the NWS a real time report of our local weather. Include medicines, medical supplies, batteries, and chargers.




Make copies of Medicaid, Medicare, and other insurance cards.



- Need-to-know information for first responders and others who might need to help you.
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




A CERT member (Victim) beingcarried to safety


