2	ATTORNY GALLAGHER: I'd like to
3	call the meeting to order, the
4	January 31st meeting of the Nassau
5	County Transit Committee.
6	On the agenda today is a review of
7	the 2024 operating budget, the Q3 for
8	2023 score card, service updates, and
9	community outreach.
10	I would do a roll call, but I know
11	we do not have a quorum. So, I will
12	turn this over to Jack for his
13	presentation.
14	MR. KHZOUZ: Thank you,
15	Mr. Gallagher.
16	I appreciate, Mr. Gallagher, the
17	new county attorney, supporting the
18	board. I certainly appreciate his
19	support.
20	I want to say Happy New Year,
21	first of all, to everyone. Thank you,
22	board, for your past support and
23	guidance. We appreciate it very much.
2 4	In the room today, along with our

public that we serve every day, we have

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a large group of leadership from NICE

Bus here. They're the folks that

really run the service every day, from

Able-Ride and Operations Safety,

planning. They're the heroes that run

the service every day. I appreciate

everybody being here.

We have a short presentation, and at the end, obviously we'll take comments and questions from the board and comments and questions from the public. So, hopefully we can get this going.

So, again, as Mr. Gallagher mentioned, we're going to talk about the operating budget next year. This is a preview. We're not going to -- it has nothing to do with today but it's just a preview of what we have been expecting.

We're going to get together at the end of March to actually see the actual budget and go from there. We'll talk about the score card. We'll have some

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 service updates and some community outreach updates for everybody.

There is also some capital projects that we'll talk about here too that have kind of come into fruition.

So, the projected budget, some good news on the budget. We look like we're going to be fully funded for next year, which is, again, a great support from both our state representatives, our local representatives. The federal government has really come in to support the transit system.

You know, we're here to move communities, promote economic development, give everybody access.

So, let's go over it. As normal, the orange is the biggest part of our budget. Sixty-eight percent of our budget is made up of the state operating assistance. This is what we project the state to supply us to operate the system for next year.

We'll find out what the actual

number is March 31st, April 1st,
assuming that the state finalizes the
budget at that period.

So, we'll have a very, very good indication the third week of March when we have our next meeting, and we can vote on the assumptions that we have here, but right now we're projecting this number.

The Nassau County requires STOA match, or the match against the state, is 2.5 million. The next three lines are federal funds used to operate. So, it's about a 20-million-dollar federal funds that operate the system.

New York State to help match those funds has to supply \$700,000 and the county has to supply another \$700,000 to match all the federal funds that makes up 1.4.

Passenger revenues, about \$31 million, so it's a good part of our operating revenue. And, you know, obviously without our riders, we don't

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 really serve a purpose. So, we understand that very much.

Then the nonuser revenue, what is that? That is advertising. Mostly advertising. It's a little bit of some other fees that come into us, but really 99 percent of that is the advertising that's on the side of the vehicle. So, very important to understand.

So, 169.2, that's a much bigger number than last year. Why is that a bigger number? We're going to talk about it a little later, but it's really to supply and support our paratransit division.

Inmer Hernandez is here today. He is our director of pratransit operations.

The paratransit division has been mandated by the FTA to expand service into Queens, both on the south and the north, and into Suffolk County also.

So, that really is a number that

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 reflects that expanded service.

But, we started that back last year, the largest part -- launch, January 1st, when we started service to Flushing and Jamaica. So, that's why it's there.

Again, the county has been great at supporting and understanding that we have to do that. It's a mandate by the FTA.

So, let's go into service updates. What we are projected to plan for, for next year or for the year that we're in right now -- first of all, let's hit the score card really quickly.

The score card we do quarterly.

I'm sorry, I think I wrote third

quarter. It's really the fourth

quarter score card here.

So, we'll go across the top on the fixed route side. We measure on-time performance. We measure missed number of pullouts at the gate here. We also measure number of accidents per hundred

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 thousand as a ratio.

Those are standard -- industry standard KPIs, or industry standard measurements that we look at.

So, for the fourth quarter, our total average on-time performance was about 89 percent. That gave us an incentive of \$5,000. Again, there is no money that changes hands here. It's credits and debits basically. So, we hit that number.

Our missed pullouts were one tenth of one percent. So, a fairly small number. Again, that hit the number. It wasn't a -- it wasn't a penalty or reward, we just happened to hit that little sweet spot there.

Then accidents per hundred thousand, I'm not really proud of this number. Our accidents creeped up a little bit. We count everything as an accident. So, even if we brush a signpost or a tree limb, we count that as an accident.

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We back into a -- back over a curb, we count that as an accident.

Even if there's no damage, zero damage, we count it as an accident.

So, unfortunately, we didn't make our accident numbers both on the para and fixed side route. That tends to be an industry trend right now with transit. Accidents are creeping up a little bit.

Part of that reason is the amount of new drivers that we've got coming into the system right now.

Not only are our ranks affected by what's going on out there with hiring, which is challenging, right, but it's also being affected by retirees.

We have a large number of folks retiring. Those 25 year, 30-year, 40-year drivers. And we have a few that are 50-year drivers. They're retiring now. So, you know, again, we're feeling it a little bit.

But, again, accidents are minor,

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 and we'll hopefully keep it that way.

On the pratransit side, our KPIs are a little different. We add call answer ratios because, again, remember, all our clients call for trips.

So, the call center is very, very busy. The number of calls they actually pick up and answer before people disconnect, 94 percent, 93 percent. Again, no incentive or hit on that one, so it's basically zero.

On-time performance, 86 percent, which Inmer and his team should very proud of. Again, it's a door-to-door service. We're picking up and dropping off customers throughout that time.

So, you could have five people on a van and pick up and drop off people throughout the county and hit them all on time is sometimes a challenge. But 85 percent, 86 percent is very good.

Missed pullouts, again, very low again here on the paratransit side.

That does not mean anyone was denied

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 service. Everybody got service.

So, accidents, again, much higher than we wanted, but, again, minor accidents. We're working on some plan to get that out.

Then productivity, the amount of passengers per hour we're able to transport on a shared ride service.

1.30 is a fairly good ratio. It means you're being efficient enough but you are also -- you are being efficient but you are not inconveniencing the riders on the trips.

You're not making the trips too long. You're not putting too many trips outside the on-time performance mark. It's just the right balance.

So, anyway, that's the score card for the quarter. We'll talk about it and cover it again at the next meeting so that we can be a little bit more official with this.

I did want to show this chart.

There's been a lot of questions about,

well, what does ridership recovery look
like since Covid took hold?

And you can see the blue dot at the very top that says 100 back in between 2019/2020, March I think it was 2020 when we got hit, and we automatically saw a drop in ridership down to 60 percent.

The orange line represents our on-time performance over time. And the reason I want to show this is, as ridership has recovered -- and we're in about 87 percent right now -- our on-time performance has actually improved.

So, there's a lot to be said for what our performance team has done, what our operations team has done to ensure that hasn't eroded, on-time performance hasn't eroded over time as more people board the bus. It's actually improved.

Now, and this is as of the end of 2023, currently, the end of January, it

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looks like on-time performance -- we have to still do some work on the number -- the on-time performance looks like it's hit 92 percent. So, we're fairly happy with that.

Now we're digging down deeper in on-time performance and looking at it by trip, by direction, by route, by time of day. So, it's not just one big average number, because if you are Mrs. Jones standing, you know, somewhere at your stop and you're not getting 92 percent, we want to find out why, right?

So, that's how we're going to be able to take 92 percent to 94 percent, by digging in deeper. We've still got some work to do there, but a pretty good number.

So, the updates for 2024 on the service. You know, I don't want to characterize this -- over-characterize it, but in general, it's good news.

It's all service additions, service

We're not perfect. We know that.

We're running a very complex system

with 500, 600 drivers and complex

machines that break down on Nassau

County roads that are challenging, and

Nassau County traffic, but we try to do

our best.

With John Feldman, who is the director of schedule and planning, he's gone through it methodically. He looked at every route and tried to show some improvements in the route.

Our basic budget, though, for the fixed route is almost flat. We're not really seeing an increase in the operating budget for the fixed route.

So, how does John increase service or improve service? It's really tweaking service. It's really looking at what we can be more efficient with. And his partnership with operations really helps that.

So, the N1 in the a.m. and p.m.,

we've increased frequency to 18 to 20
minutes. We've added trips that will
help that service quite a bit.

It's a very convoluted route in the south; it takes a lot of time to get out of that area and get going to where you need to go, but John and his team have done -- with operations have done a great job in getting on-time performance where it should be.

The N6, we've added short turns on weekdays. That just adds more service, more buses. The N20X added more stops. The 22X added express stops. That's been a big hit with our passengers. The N24, again, there are some changes there in how we routed the buses, especially on the weekends.

And, again, it balances the loads a little better so we don't have overloads sometimes and we don't have empty buses at other times. So, John has balanced that pretty well.

Again, the 35, the same thing;

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he's done some balancing there. We've
done some better job on the connections
on the 54/55 on the east side. The 72
trips have been flipped to the N70s, so
that's working its way through.

And then again, the Able-Ride service, to extend Able-Ride as much as we did without our clients suffering.

In other words, without extending trips, without lateness, without everything else.

Again, I'll give Inmer and his team a big high five for that one.

So, additional service updates
later on in the year. What are we
looking at? On the right-hand side, by
the way, is our new electric bus. So,
it's the first that arrived end of
last -- well, middle of last year.
It's on the road now. It's serving the
N16. It's the first electric bus on
Long Island.

We have five more that just arrived. They're going through the DOT

process now and being inspected. We
hope to have those on the road probably
by the third week of February. So,
we'll have the full fleet of electric
buses out there for everybody.

So, some pretty good reviews on them. The drivers like them. The passengers like them. So, let's keep our fingers crossed. But, very cool. Some great graphics. We really like those vehicles.

So, we are planning some additional on-demand microtransit service mini, which is now in Freeport to Lynbrook. Very successful. Providing over a hundred rides a day. We're looking at some additional opportunities to expand that type of service to different areas.

Again, the way we use mini is to connect people to other routes. To the Long Island Railroad. To the libraries. And we look at corridors and say, okay, what are the major

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 generators in those corridors?

Long Island Railroad on each end, two large fixed route buses so that people can travel in and out of those communities a lot easier than currently is happening. So mini has been a big, big hit. Again, more expansion as we go.

Before we talked about the Able-Ride expansion. Electric buses, I just covered that. Again, on the N16, which goes right by the depot, so if we need to charge, we can charge in a day and swap buses out.

You're not going to see chargers spread out through Nassau County. You know, no one is going to like that.

So, what we have tried to do is design the electric bus routes to ensure that they always come by this depot so that we can charge them on site here.

And very happy to announce that the final phase of the Rosa Parks

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Transit Center refresh is going to
start here momentarily, literally
within the next few weeks.

All the surfaces are going to be updated on the inside of the terminal, new floors, new walls, new doors, new air curtains around the doors. There is going to be a new convenience store built out. So, it will really look fresh and very, very nice.

We're very, very happy about it and very proud, and I think the community will be happy with it too.

So, community outreach. Erika is here. Everybody knows Erika. Erika is our director of customer engagement and communication.

Did a great job this year with community outreach. She did over 50 events, fifty events in the county. She only has a team of three. So, to hit 50 events is great.

We did the Santa bus again this year. A great, great reaction to that.

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Took it to a couple of schools, United
Cerebral Palsy, and a couple of other
locations. Taught kids a little bit
about bus safety. But more
importantly, they saw Santa Claus.
That was the important thing.

Then Island Harvest is our big push for the year at the end of the year. We do events all through the year, but Island Harvest is our big beneficiary. At the end of the year, the team, the employees collected \$16,000 worth of food. So, that's a big deal for them.

Lastly, I'm going to throw this out there just to help everybody plan a little bit. I should have probably done this 10 years ago, 12 years ago, but just kind of plot out maybe some potential future BTC meeting dates.

MEMBER BERSE: June 20th is no good for me.

MR. KHZOUZ: That's why we're planning them now. We can obviously

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mess with these dates a little bit.

Normally, we try to do this on a Thursday night, third Thursday of whatever month it is, but, again, we're very, very flexible. We thought we'd get it out to everybody now.

Mr. Gallagher, that concludes the presentation. I'm sorry, do you want to go back?

So, if the board has any questions, we will start with the board first and then we'll go from there.

Joel?

MEMBER BERSE: Have there been any concerns about the electric buses because there are major issues within the Hicksville Fire Department, and I know a couple of others that they've been talking within fire departments, because of battery fires.

And I didn't know -- I know you guys had talked to the fire marshal, whatever like that, but is it totally alleviated as concerns or is it still

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 the potential that they're worried?

MR. KHZOUZ: Safety is never fully mitigated, right? Safety concerns are never actually mitigated. The best we can all do is plan for the worst, right, and train, train, train, train, train.

MEMBER BERSE: But you are on bus, bus, bus, bus, bus.

MR. KHZOUZ: Right. So, we have taken every precaution for storage locally. When buses are on the road, we've trained the drivers on what to do in case there is any type of incident.

We are in the process now of recontacting the fire marshal for them to organize village first responders to come in and look at the vehicle, as they normally do when we get new equipment.

So, they'll go through the equipment, they'll learn more from the OEM how to deal with issues. But, you know, it's a concern obviously, and

2	we've taken every precaution we can.
3	MEMBER BERSE: Where are the
4	batteries physically? Are they on top
5	like the CNG or
6	MR. KHZOUZ: They're on the bottom
7	of the vehicle underneath
8	MEMBER BERSE: So, what if
9	something happens when a fire goes up?
10	The whole bus
11	MR. KHZOUZ: Fires don't normally
12	go up; fires go out in this particular
13	case. They go out the sides. That's
14	where the fireproof is in the floor,
15	so the fire will go out.
16	Now, it's all a theory until it
17	happens. What's the famous line from,
18	I think it's Mike Tyson, everybody has
19	a plan until you get punched in the
20	face.
21	MEMBER BERSE: Either that or,
22	don't assume.
23	MR. KHZOUZ: All we can do is plan
24	for what we've been educated on and

what the industry has been educated on.

2	So, you know, again, with six
3	vehicles, I cannot think of another
4	system outside the MTA in New York City
5	or New York State that has more
6	vehicles right now than we do. So,
7	everybody is learning.
8	So, not a great answer, not the
9	best answer, but it's the answer, you
10	know.
11	MEMBER BERSE: Okay. Well, it's
12	not like it's ignored, so that's what's
13	important.
14	MR. KHZOUZ: Not at all.
15	MEMBER BERSE: Has the Alpine
16	project on the south side of the
17	Hicksville station been in touch with
18	you? Because I know they're about to
19	start doing things.
20	MR. KHZOUZ: Yeah, we have heard
21	from a few folks. And I think it's on
22	John's
23	MR. FELDMAN: I just spoke with
24	him today.
25	MR. KHZOUZ: It's on John's

2	calendar and Erika's calendar to make
3	sure that we're involved.

MS. RICHARDS: We're working on it with them right now.

MEMBER DUROSEAU: How many electric buses do you have all together, six?

MR. KHZOUZ: Six. The plan is to go to, I believe, 16 total and then pause and decide as an industry, not just us, really what the next thing is. Is this technology the right one? Is there another technology?

Again, I want to remind everybody:
All our fixed route buses except for
these six compress natural gas, so
they're already almost no omission.
They are low omission. And they are a
great fleet. Man, they're a great
fleet.

If we're going to jump, it's going to be a major capital project to do that. You know, people are talking about a lot of other propulsion

2	systems, but really electric is really
3	the only thing out there right now.
4	And everybody is still proving. Still
5	proof.
6	MEMBER DUROSEAU: I do like the
7	paint job. I feel like we spent a lot
8	of money for those. I mean, the paint
9	job.
10	MR. KHZOUZ: Those were designed
11	by Sharon and John.
12	MEMBER DUROSEAU: Good job.
13	MR. KHZOUZ: I don't think there
14	is any other questions for me for now.
15	MS. SIMPKINS: I have a question.
16	MR. KHZOUZ: At this point,
17	Mr. Gallagher, if it's okay with you,
18	we can ask the public if they have any
19	comments.

My name is Richard

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Crawley (phon). I live at 425 Newbridge

Road, Apartment 32, East Meadow.

Can someone please record me so I can hear myself yak?

MR. CRAWLEY: I have some chief concerns, top which is, I know you heard -- I know you guys talked about you're expanding the mini bus service, you know. I'm just curious where it's going to be expanded to.

I mean, there are a number of areas that could really benefit, like Hicksville, where the N73/74 was.

Like, even south of -- even south of Hempstead Turnpike where the N50 and N47 used to run.

I mean, we're in a serious dead zone area as far as public transportation is concerned in those areas. At least the ones I know about.

I think you could really benefit from the mini bus service from Hempstead Turnpike along Newbridge Road

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 straight down to Bellmore station and connecting to -- and also connecting to the N49, you know, north of Hempstead, along the same thing.

What else? Also, here are some avenue -- inter-area can really benefit from expanded service because there are places that do depend -- that do need buses, you know, in one form or another.

I know that the fixed route bus budget is flat. Am I right?

MR. KHZOUZ: Correct.

MR. CRAWLEY: Well, I'm just curious about how are we going to increase it? I mean, how are we going to explain to the Nassau County Legislature that we need more money from the Nassau County budget, you know?

Because they keep on talking about, you know, casino. You think everyone is going to drive in? No. They're going to depend on buses

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 getting them to and from the Hicksville station, the Mineola station, and a bunch of other stations.

Look, I get it, times are tight, times are tight as what it is now, but you know what? You know what's even tighter? I mean, people are getting hurt on the roads. I mean, pedestrians cars, bikes.

I mean, we're dealing with a huge uptick in bad drivers. If you don't believe me, read the newspapers.

MEMBER BERSE: Let's try to wrap it up.

MR. CRAWLEY: I'm sorry. I'm just going to tell you this. We need to increase mini bus service or restore bus lines and get more buses for the N50, the N47, the N73/74. That way, we can restore bus service to everywhere.

Also, I can't -- even though this is Nassau County, I can't get any ride to Jericho area. I mean, it's simple, there's no bus lines for those.

2	MS. SIMPKINS: The N71 doesn't go
3	to Sunrise mall anymore. They took it
4	out temporarily. How long until they
5	bring it back, and is it going to go to
6	Sunrise mall, because Sunrise mall is
7	closed now, right? It closed
8	MEMBER BERSE: When Sunrise mall
9	becomes viable again, I'm sure they
10	will consider it, but it's not viable
11	now.
12	MS. SIMPKINS: It's gone forever
13	as of now.
14	MEMBER BERSE: Well, if the mall
15	doesn't change, that's, you know,
16	unreasonable to ask them to if the mall
17	doesn't change.
18	So, anyone else?
19	MR. TOCIVIA: Joe Torcivia,
20	Levittown. And I will read from a
21	prepared statement because I'm a
22	writer, not a speaker.
23	So, many of you recall that I
24	would attend these meetings Jack
25	certainly does with a list of

certainly does -- with a list of

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 complaints over levels of service and other things, and offer feasible suggestions, not pie in the sky never happened types, and whether or not I had any actual thing to do with it, many of the most reasonable ones were acted upon and then some, and I thank you.

Today, I feel that NICE has created a very respectable bus system for what Nassau County is. More service where it needs to be and fewer empty buses traveling along underutilized routes.

My own route, the good old N49, which you've heard about over the years, thank you, has largely benefited from these changes versus what had been when I first appeared before you.

Still, there is always something, isn't there? What few shortcomings still exist and, I emphasize "few," I believe are owed to the fact that NICE regards the N49 and the N48 as one

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 route and parcels its services thusly.

True, they have the common start and end points and commonality along Front Street but for nearly half of those routes, they diverge significantly in a gap too far to walk between them, serve different communities and destinations of which some is well covered by other routes while others are not.

N48, for instance, is duplicated at the north end of Carmen Avenue by the N24 serving the family court and the Barnes & Noble office building.

The south end is covered by the different Hempstead Turnpike lines, and when the correctional center is not open to visitors, there are few significant destinations in between.

N49 has had no such duplicate coverage on Newbridge Road since the elimination of the N50, which, frankly, should have been one of the lines NICE needed to cut in terms of ridership,

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leaving the Hicksville, Levittown and

East Meadow communities along Newbridge

Road with no alternative service.

Plus, there is a significant shopping area at the intersection of Levittown Parkway and there is Walmart and a surrounding shopping center at Hempstead Turnpike, all of which are not covered by the 48. These should be considered separate routes when it comes to scheduling.

Last paragraph. Weekday N49
service, like so much else, has gotten
significantly better -- again, thank
you -- amounting to reasonable hourly
service, save occasional longer gaps
around 7:30 to 10:00 p.m., and the less
reasonable 90-minute gaps on Saturday,
all of which appears to be done as a
schedule balancing effort with the N48,
which despite the similarities, is a
different route with more alternatives.

Finally, I love the new destination signs.

But perhaps one thing that could possibly be looked at is to whether or not there might be -- to look into whether or not there can be an express bus service that goes north-south. I would like it to be the N23, but that's only because I ride it.

The second thing is whether or not the final phase of the renovations to the transit center will include soap dispensers that are embedded into the actual sink.

There are no soap dispensers on the men's restrooms. At least there used to be but they probably got torn off. Soap doesn't get stolen. And Penn Station and Grand Central sinks, restroom sinks too, because the

NASSAU COUNTY BTC - JANUARY 2024 dispensers are actually level with the faucet and everything else.

The third thing is whether or not there is going to be a push to increase bus service in time for the World Cricket Cup that's going to take place in Eisenhower Park this June.

Thank you for your time.

MEMBER BERSE: Anyone else?

Hearing no further, Jack, the floor is yours.

MR. KHZOUZ: I will try to answer as best as I can on all of that, and I will ask -- I will phone the audience when I need some help here because I don't necessarily know all of the answers. I will work backwards.

The Cricket Cup, we have been talking to the county back and forth on that. We're not sure exactly where it's going to land but we're involved in it. So, we'll see, whether it be shuttles, parking shuttles, or something else.

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> We're open to whatever we need to do to support the county in their efforts to bring events locally. So, that's great.

Great idea on the soap dispensers. My frustration there also. We'll work on that.

And, again, you know, everybody has brought up some great ideas on fixed route service, whether it be express service, and we try to add expresses as we can.

Our goal over the longer term -when we say "longer term," we're talking about, again, we've been here 12 years and I think we've done a pretty good job in evolving the system.

The next evolution is increasing speed of travel; more expresses; less stops; potentially somewhere down the line, bus lanes, things like that; and looking at how north-south connections work. So very, very important as we go forward.

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You're correct. Balancing the schedule between the N48 and 49 is certainly something we've had to do over time.

Those areas, again, back to some older N47s and 50s, yes, they weren't the best routes in the world, but we figured out a way through efficiencies on how to make them work.

Ideally, again, we could continue to add on little tweaks as we go forward. We don't believe in doing full system redos because all that does is upset everyone, and no one seems to get what they want out of it.

So, our thinking has always been evolve, make it better, evolve over time.

The N15, ma'am, does travel on Old Country Road. Oh, I'm sorry.

MR. FELDMAN: As you know, we used to run a couple of trips during the rush hour from Hempstead and Long Beach over Old Country Road to Roosevelt

3	What we were finding is, the trip
4	was so long because of all the traffic
5	on Old Country Road. It would take
6	almost 90 minutes, and we would often
7	be late.
8	So, we did change those trips to
9	go to Mineola a couple of months ago to
10	see how customers could transfer to the
11	N24 and 22 at Mineola, to continue down
12	Old Country Road.
13	We're still looking at that to see
14	if we need to put those trips back or
15	if the transverse suffices.

3	MEMBER BERSE: It's just
4	restaurants, basically.
5	MR. KHZOUZ: There are restaurant
6	staff that do take the bus that we

9	redevelop the center.
10	So, there may be a time somewhere
11	where that stop goes out to the street
12	potentially, though that's a problem on
13	Sunrise
14	(Crosstalk)
15	MEMBER BERSE: They're making a
16	proposal, the town of Oyster Bay, the
17	property owners. So, it's in play.
18	It's just nothing is decided.
19	MR. KHZOUZ: So, if there are no
20	other questions we can take
21	questions afterwards and make sure that
22	we answer everything as we can, but
23	thank you for being here and asking.
24	MS. SIMPKINS: Thanks for the good

service.

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MR. CRAWLEY: What about the

expansion, like I asked?

MR. KHZOUZ: As I said briefly, just really our goal right now is to maintain the system as it is, increase the frequency of the routes that we cover as we go forward. And more funding of resources become available, as you well pointed out, that certainly we can look at.

But there are some opportunities to add a couple more mini routes, as you mentioned, this year. So, we don't have the final there yet, so I have nothing to talk about there.

MR. CRAWLEY: I believe you are missing out on a golden opportunity.

That's my arrogant opinion, of course.

The reason why I moved to 425 is because there used to be an N50 bus service, N47. Now, I'm dependent on Able-Ride and Uber to get me to work or to other areas.

I mean, I love Able-Ride. Nothing
