WHEREAS, Section 1262-e of the New York Tax Law, as amended by Chapter 300 of the Laws of 2025, extends the Local Government Assistance Program in the County of Nassau through the calendar year beginning on January 1, 2027; now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the County Legislature of the County of Nassau, as follows:

Section 1. For the calendar year 2026, there shall be paid to the several towns and two cities of the County of Nassau pursuant to subdivision a of section 2 of Local Law No. 18-1984 as last amended by Local Law No. 4-2025 and as incorporated in chapter 4 of title 9 of the Miscellaneous Laws of Nassau County, the following sums:

Town of Hempstead	\$54,643,881
Town of Oyster Bay	\$21,993,193
Town of North Hempstead	\$15,889,355
City of Long Beach	\$2,519,044
City of Glen Cove	\$1,840,840

§ 2. The sums set forth in section 1 of this ordinance shall be subject to adjustment on a quarterly basis to reflect the actual sales and use tax revenues received by the County of Nassau from one-third of the three-quarters percent additional rate of such taxes and shall be paid to the cities and towns in four payments, as follows:

- 1st payment – April 30, 2026;
 2nd payment – July 31, 2026;
 3rd payment – October 30, 2026; and
 4th payment – January 29, 2027.

§ 3. For the calendar year of 2026, there shall be paid to the villages of the County of Nassau pursuant to subdivision d of section 2 of Local Law No. 18-1984 as last amended by Local Law No. 4-2025 and as incorporated in chapter 4 of title 9 of the Miscellaneous Laws of Nassau County, the following sums:

WHEREAS, Section 466-a of the New York State Real Property Tax Law, as amended by Chapter 592 of the Laws of 2025, establishes a real property tax exemption for surviving spouses of volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers killed in the line of duty; and

WHEREAS, Section 466-a requires local governing bodies to pass a local law, notwithstanding any other provision of law, to opt into the tax exemption permitted under Section 466-a; now, therefore

BE IT ENACTED by the County Legislature of the County of Nassau as follows:

Section 1. Subsections 1, 4 and 5 of Section 6-2.6 of Title A of Chapter VI of the Nassau County Administrative Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

§6-2.6 Partial Exemption from Taxation for Volunteer Firefighters and Volunteer Ambulance Workers

1. Real property owned by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service or such enrolled member and spouse residing in Nassau County shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of up to ten percent of the assessed value and surviving spouses of members killed in the line of duty shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of up to fifty percent of the assessed value of such property for county purposes, exclusive of special assessments.
4. [Un-remarried spouses of volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers killed in the line of duty. The County shall continue an exemption or reinstate a pre-existing exemption claimed under this section by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, for such deceased enrolled member's un-remarried spouse if such member is killed in the line of duty] Real property owned by a surviving spouse of an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service killed in the line of duty, shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of fifty percent of the assessed valuation thereof, provided, however, that:
 - (a) such [un-remarried] surviving spouse is certified by the board of directors of the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as [an un-remarried] a surviving spouse of an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who was killed in the line of duty; and
 - (b) such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least [five] two years;and
 - (c) such deceased volunteer had been receiving [the] an exemption prior to their death.
5. [Un-remarried] Surviving spouses of volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers. The County shall continue an exemption or reinstate a pre-existing exemption to [an un-remarried] a surviving spouse of a deceased enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department, or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; provided, however, that:

(a) such [un-remarried] surviving spouse is certified by the board of directors of the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as [an un-remarried] a surviving spouse of a deceased enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; and

(b) such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least twenty years; and

(c) such deceased volunteer and [un-remarried] surviving spouse had been receiving the exemption for such property prior to the death of such volunteer.

§ 2. A new Subsection 4-a is hereby added to Section 6-2.6 of Title A of Chapter VI of the Nassau County Administrative Code to read as follows:

4-a. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, the provisions of this section shall apply to any real property held in trust solely for the benefit of a person or persons who would otherwise be eligible for a real property tax exemption, pursuant to subdivision four of this section, were such person or persons the owner or owners of such real property.

(a) For the purposes of this section, title to that portion of real property owned by a cooperative apartment corporation in which a tenant-stockholder of such corporation resides and which is represented by their share or shares of stock in such corporation as determined by its or their proportional relationship to the total outstanding stock of the corporation, including that owned by the corporation, shall be deemed to be vested in such tenant-stockholder.

(b) Provided that all other eligibility criteria of this section are met, that proportion of the assessment of such real property owned by a cooperative apartment corporation determined by the relationship of such real property vested in such tenant-stockholder to such real property

owned by such cooperative apartment corporation in which such tenant-stockholder resides shall be subject to exemption from taxation pursuant to this section and any exemption so granted shall be credited by the appropriate taxing authority against the assessed valuation of such real property; the reduction in real property taxes realized thereby shall be credited by the cooperative apartment corporation against the amount of such taxes otherwise payable by or chargeable to such tenant-stockholder.

(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) of this subdivision, a tenant-stockholder who resides in a dwelling that is subject to the provisions of either article two, four, five or eleven of the private housing finance law shall not be eligible for an exemption pursuant to this section.

(d) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) of this subdivision, real property owned by a cooperative apartment corporation may be exempt from taxation pursuant to this section by a municipality in which such real property is located only if the governing body of such municipality, after public hearing, adopts a local law, ordinance or resolution providing therefor.

§ 3. Severability. If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual,

corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

§ 4. It is hereby determined, pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, 8 N.Y.E.C.L. Section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that the adoption of this local law is a “Type II” Action within the meaning of Section 617.5(c)(26) of 6 N.Y.C.R.R., and, accordingly, is of a class of actions which do not have a significant effect on the environment; and no further review is required.

§ 5. This local law shall take effect immediately.

A LOCAL LAW TO PROHIBIT THE SALE OF NITROUS OXIDE WHIPPED CREAM CHARGERS IN NASSAU COUNTY EXCEPT TO BUSINESSES WITH APPROPRIATE FOOD SALE PERMITS OR LICENSES

BE IT ENACTED by the County Legislature of the County of Nassau as follows:

Section 1. Short Title. This law shall be known as the "Nitrous Oxide Consumer Protection Act" and shall appear in the Miscellaneous Laws of Nassau County as Title 94.

§2. Legislative Intent. The Nassau County Legislature finds that whipped cream chargers, which contain nitrous oxide gas, are often misused for recreational inhalation that pose significant health risks including abnormal blood counts, asphyxiation, blood clots, frostbite, headache, impaired bowel and bladder function, lightheadedness, limb weakness, loss of consciousness, numbness, palpitations, paralysis, psychiatric disturbances (delusions, hallucinations, paranoia, depression), tingling, trouble walking, vitamin B12 deficiency, neurological damage including spinal cord and brain damage, and in some cases, death. While state law already regulates certain aspects of their sale, additional local restrictions are necessary to prevent unauthorized access and misuse. This local law aims to limit the sale of nitrous oxide containers to legitimate food-related businesses that hold permits under relevant New York State laws, thereby limiting the likelihood of abuse.

§3. Definitions. Unless otherwise expressly stated in this Local Law, the following terms shall be defined as:

- a. “Nitrous Oxide Container” shall mean a cylinder or cartridge filled with nitrous oxide (N₂O) that is used as a whipping agent in a whipped cream dispenser. This definition shall not apply to nitrous oxide that has been premixed with a dairy product or a dairy-like product for the purpose of making a whipped topping or pre-pressurized whipped cream dispensers where the nitrous oxide charger is fully incorporated into the product’s sealed design, such as single-use cans intended for direct dispensing of whipped cream, and where the charger cannot be accessed, removed, or repurposed for non-culinary uses without destroying the product.
- b. “Person” shall mean any individual, company, partnership, corporation, limited partnership, joint venture or other legal entity.
- c. “Food Sale Permit” shall mean a valid permit or license issued pursuant to: (i) The New York State Sanitary Code (10 NYCRR Part 14) or other provisions of the New York State Public Health Law authorizing the operation of a food service establishment or the sale of food; or (ii) The New York State Agriculture and Markets Law, including but not limited to Article 20-C (Licensing of Food Processing Establishments) or Article 28 (Retail Food Stores), or (iii) the Nassau County Public Health Ordinance.

§4. Prohibitions.

- a. No Person shall sell or offer for sale any Nitrous Oxide Container to any Person unless the Person possesses a current and valid Food Sale Permit as defined in Section 3(c) of this local law.
- b. Prior to any sale, the seller shall verify that the purchaser holds a valid Food Sale Permit by inspecting a copy of such permit or obtaining written certification from the purchaser attesting to the permit’s validity, including the permit number, issuing authority, and expiration date. The Person selling Nitrous Oxide Containers shall maintain records of such verifications for a period of at least two years, which shall be made available for inspection by the Nassau County Department of Health, the Nassau County Department of Consumer Affairs, the Nassau County Police Department or other authorized enforcement officials upon request.
- c. This section shall not apply to sales between manufacturers, distributors, or wholesalers of whipped cream chargers where both parties are licensed under applicable state or federal laws for such activities, provided that the end Purchaser complies with subsection (a).

§5. Enforcement and Penalties.

- 1. This law shall be enforced by the Nassau County Department of Health, the Nassau County Department of Consumer Affairs, and the Nassau County Police Department or other authorized enforcement officials.

2. Any Person that violates section 4 of this title shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars or imprisonment of not more than one year, or both.
 - a. An additional fine of one thousand five hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars may be added for each subsequent violation of section 4.
3. Any Person that violates section 4 of this title by selling, offering for sale or otherwise distributing any Nitrous Oxide Container to a Minor shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than one-thousand five hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars or imprisonment of not more than one year, or both.
 - a. An additional fine of two thousand five hundred (\$2,500.00) dollars may be added for each subsequent violation of section 4.
4. In addition to fines, the County may seek injunctive relief to prevent continued violations, and repeated violations may result in the suspension or revocation of any county-issued business licenses or permits held by the violator.

§6. **Severability.** If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this local law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership entity or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which order or judgment shall be rendered.

§7. **SEQRA Determination.** It is hereby determined by the Nassau County Legislature, the lead agency, and pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), 8 NYECL section 0101 et seq. and its implementing regulations, Part 617 of 6 NYCRR, and Section 1611 of the County Government Law of Nassau County, that this Local Law will not have a significant impact on the environment and that no further environmental review or action is required.

§8. **Effective Date.** This law shall take effect immediately after becoming a law.

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3 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Good
4 morning, everyone. We should get started.

5 Legislator Nicks, would you lead us
6 in the Pledge, please.

7 (Whereupon, the Pledge of
8 Allegiance is said.)

9 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. We
10 will start out with our monthly honor of
11 the Top Cops for this month. And we'll
12 start with the with the PBA and the
13 honoree is Police Officer Jack Castronova
14 and his K9 partner, EJ.

15 MR. SHEVLIN: Good afternoon,
16 everybody. Thank you once again for
17 always honoring our Top Cops.

18 On December 21, 2025, at
19 approximately 7:40 p.m., Police Officer
20 Jack Castronova and his K9 partner, EJ,
21 responded to a 911 call for a high risk
22 missing person. The missing person was a
23 female who was suffering from dementia
24 and believed to be missing for
25 approximately 1.5 hours in the freezing

1
2 conditions of December. Officer
3 Castronova deployed his K9 partner, EJ,
4 and conducted a search in the surrounding
5 area. EJ began to exhibit distinct
6 behavior changes that indicated the scent
7 trail continued off the property behind a
8 fence line. This goes to the proper
9 training that our K9 Officers and dogs go
10 to and go through together. Knowing your
11 canine dog is vital, and people need to
12 realize that that is our Police Officer's
13 partner. So they work together. This dog
14 is not just a good looking dog, but this
15 dog is a Police Officer. EJ led him to an
16 unheated horse barn adjacent to the
17 property where the missing person was
18 located. After our Police Officer picked
19 up the dog and put him over the fence to
20 continue on the scent trail, then our
21 Police Officer jumped over the fence
22 himself to follow along with his partner.

23 The missing person was found cold,
24 disoriented, and exhibited signs
25 consistent with the onset of hypothermia.

1
2 Obviously, if somebody is outside in the
3 freezing cold for that long, hypothermia
4 is a reality, especially at this missing
5 person's age. Officer Castronova remained
6 with the female reassuring her and
7 maintaining her responsiveness until
8 further EMS personnel arrived on scene
9 and the female was evaluated and treated.

10 Thanks to Police Officer Jack
11 Castronova and K9 EJ's quick action and
12 experience, the missing person was
13 located and treated.

14 This is a perfect example for
15 everybody here, for our communities, to
16 witness what Police Officers do every
17 single day and night.

18 Everybody always thinks that we're
19 just out there fighting crime. That we
20 do. And that's why we are the safest
21 county in the country. However, we do a
22 lot more things that are very important
23 to our health and safety of our
24 communities, and they saved a life
25 working together and using that training

1
2 and utilizing our canines.

3 The PBA is proud to honor Police
4 Officer Jack Castronova and K9 EJ as our
5 Legislative Top Cops, February 2026.

6 COMMISSIONER RYDER: Good afternoon,
7 everybody. First of all, I want to thank
8 the Nassau County Police Department
9 Foundation through our very gracious
10 communities, donate our dogs. So the
11 taxpayer doesn't pay for the ten dogs
12 that we have. It's paid for by our
13 Foundation. So we're very grateful. Ali
14 Nagoli (phonetic) and Eric Blumencrantz,
15 who do this -- along with all of our
16 horses that sit in our stable and go out
17 and do great work for us. I just told
18 this to Channel 7 in the back, these
19 missing kids, it's all about timing.
20 We're working on a case right now up in
21 the Second Precinct where we're trying to
22 find a young lady, we probably get about
23 ten cases a week that people don't
24 realize because of the great work that
25 our Missing Persons Squad does, along

1
2 with the tools that we've been given by
3 this body and makes us go out and find
4 these people. Because a matter of
5 minutes, hours, days, means the
6 difference of life and death. And what
7 the K9 unit does every single day for us
8 is phenomenal.

9 They're also a great public
10 relations tool. Everybody loves the dog.
11 Just don't put your hand near the mouth
12 too fast. We're very grateful for what
13 you've given us here today. Thank you.

14 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Officer
15 Castronova, would you like to say a few
16 words, and we'd like to hear from EJ as
17 well.

18 OFFICER CASTRANOVA: I'd just like to
19 thank everyone here for the honor, tThe
20 Legislature, Top Cop Committee the
21 Department. It's a great day for me
22 because we get to recognize EJ's hard
23 work. We put in endless hours of training
24 every day. And it might just seem to him
25 like endless games of hide and seek where

1
2 he's just excited to get the ball at the
3 end. But we see that there's real value
4 in what he does for the Department, for
5 Nassau County and how amazing these dogs
6 could be. And just want to thank
7 everybody. Thank you.

8 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator
9 Goetz?

10 LEGISLATOR GOETZ: Good afternoon.
11 Well, I want to say thank you, Police
12 Officer Castronova and to EJ, and of
13 course, to the PBA and our Police
14 Department for this incredible work. Your
15 training saved a life.

16 This area is Chicken Valley Road is
17 all farms and grassland and this isn't
18 just going up and down streets. This
19 woman could have been anywhere. So the
20 training and the expertise in your quick
21 action, saved a life. And I know
22 personally my grandmother has dementia
23 and how easily they could just get lost.
24 And it's very scary. So you really saved
25 a family from tragedy.

1
2 So thank you for everything that you
3 do each and every day. Thank you, EJ;
4 he's very handsome. And I just want to
5 say thank you to our Police entirely for
6 all that you do each and every day for
7 all of us keeping us safe. So thank you
8 so much from the bottom of my heart.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Would you
10 like to come up for a quick photo?

11 (Whereupon, photos were taken.)

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2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Next we
3 have the DAI Detectives.

4 DETECTIVE SICCARI: Good afternoon. I
5 just want to thank everybody for having
6 us.

7 In June of 2023, two unknown
8 suspects entered a storefront in Hewlett.
9 The suspects began assaulting multiple
10 employees at the location, including one
11 59-year-old woman who was punched in the
12 face along with being struck with a
13 chair. One of the suspects pulled out a
14 handgun, placing multiple people within
15 the storefront in fear for their lives.

16 With limited leads, Detective Sicari
17 and Barbieri began working the case. The
18 investigation lasted well over a year and
19 the detectives used advanced
20 investigation techniques, including cell
21 phone warrants, cultivating CI's, and
22 joint cooperation with the Nassau County
23 Police Department, FBI Gang Task Force
24 Officer Detective Selleck.

25 Thanks to the hard work of these

1
2 detectives, two illegal firearms were
3 recovered and taken off our streets.
4 Multiple arrests were made.

5 The detectives also uncovered a
6 large amount of valuable criminal
7 intelligence on multiple gangs and
8 organized crimes that affected our
9 streets. These detectives worked for well
10 over a year, multiple units within the
11 department to close these cases. I just
12 want to thank them for their hard work.
13 Thank you for you guys.

14 COMMISSIONER RYDER: So as I think
15 you all know, we got a lot of changes in
16 the Police Department, promotions, a lot
17 of new chiefs, lieutenants, sergeants.
18 And in this case, this is a situation
19 where one of our young detectives is now
20 going to be a great sergeant for us, and
21 we're very proud of him.

22 This work that gets done every
23 single day with our detectives, they
24 can't wave the flag. They can't come out
25 and pat themselves on the back because of

1
2 the sensitivity of the cases. This is one
3 of those cases. There is ongoing
4 investigations that's going on. They
5 continue to do great work, and we
6 continue to work together as both
7 detective, supervisors, and cops to make
8 sure that we serve the best in Nassau
9 County.

10 So again, we thank you for this
11 opportunity for them.

12 DETECTIVE SICARI: Thank you.
13 Detective Sicari. I'll make this quick,
14 I'm not a wordsmith.

15 Thank you to the Legislature for
16 this award, DAI, and the board. But
17 really, this this award really is
18 deserved for Detective Barbieri. He did a
19 fantastic job, in my humble opinion. He
20 may not look it, but he's a very smart
21 guy, a very talented guy -- I'm just
22 joking (laughter). And detective Dezelic
23 as well. He took me under his wing and
24 showed me a lot of new tricks and old
25 school tricks. I'm forever thankful for

1
2 the both of them, and thank you very
3 much. That's it.

4 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Anyone
5 else? No. Okay.

6 Thank you, detective, and all of
7 you, for the work that you do. I live
8 close by where we're talking about, and
9 being the safest county in Nassau, it
10 doesn't come by accident. And where we
11 live, that's pretty close to New York
12 City. And that's got to make your job
13 that much harder. Your dogged persistence
14 in getting these things done over a great
15 length of time, it just shows your
16 dedication to duty, and I'm sure all of
17 us here appreciate it.

18 So thank you very much. And that's
19 it. Would you like to come up for a
20 picture.

21 (Whereupon, photos were taken.)

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2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay.

3 Finally, we have Top Responders, the
4 Nassau County Probation Officers.

5 MR. KALENDAR: Good afternoon. So
6 today we have our probation Officers and
7 fire marshals.

8 On January 8th of 2026, Nassau
9 County Probation Officers Alexandra
10 Bufalo, Cindy Bonilla, and Robert
11 Ciminelli conducted a routine and
12 proactive home visit at a residence in
13 Wantagh as a part of their ongoing
14 supervision and community safety
15 responsibilities.

16 During the visit, the Officer's keen
17 observation, skills, training and
18 attention to detail led to the discovery
19 of a significant quantity of illegal
20 narcotics, including methamphetamines,
21 MDMA and ketamine, along with indicators
22 consistent of a possible clandestine drug
23 laboratory operating within the home.

24 Recognizing the serious public
25 safety risks associated with the presence

1
2 of hazardous chemicals and potential
3 explosive materials, the probation
4 officers immediately secured the scene
5 and notified the appropriate authority.

6 The Nassau County Fire Marshal
7 Hazardous Materials Unit was subsequently
8 requested to respond to the location and
9 conducted an assessment of the scene
10 utilizing advanced chemical
11 identification equipment to analyze and
12 identify approximately 20 chemical
13 samples.

14 The fire marshal members operating
15 on scene included Assistant Chief Fire
16 Marshal Andrew Schmidt, Captain Michael
17 Menella, Lieutenant John Madden and fire
18 marshals Martin Golden, Vincent Bitsko
19 and Cristian Dambreville.

20 To date, the alleged perp is still
21 in remand and is awaiting his court date.

22 Through their professionalism,
23 dedication and vigilance, the Nassau
24 County Probation Officers and Fire
25 Marshals exemplified the highest

1
2 standards of public service. Their
3 coordinated actions highlighted the
4 critical role these public safety
5 professionals play in safeguarding
6 neighborhoods, protecting residents, and
7 ensuring that the overall well-being of
8 the community and keeping Nassau County
9 the safest in America. Thank you.

10 MR. PLAKIS: Hello, John Plakis,
11 Probation Director. I just want to thank
12 the Officers for doing a great job. This
13 is what the Officers do every day, is
14 keep the residents safe and work with the
15 other departments. Thank you.

16 CHIEF UTTARO: Mike Uttaro, Chief
17 Fire Marshal, to echo his sentiments
18 exactly, is working with other agencies
19 interoperability, making things happen
20 together as a team.

21 Definitely, I would be remiss if I
22 didn't thank all of you on the county
23 legislature, our County Executive's
24 Office, and OEM for securing grants and
25 funding.

1
2 Running a hazmat team takes a lot of
3 training, endless training, and an awful
4 lot of money. It takes a lot of funding
5 for the what ifs, and what if this
6 happens? And this was one of those events
7 and all that came together and that
8 training and the funding for the very
9 expensive equipment and other things that
10 we need to use to mitigate situations
11 such as this.

12 So we thank all of you for your
13 support, and I'm definitely proud of the
14 guys and the hard work that they put into
15 this. Thank you.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator
17 Knight?

18 LEGISLATOR KNIGHT: Thank you,
19 Presiding Officer. I want to say thank
20 you for the Nassau County Probation
21 Officers and the hazmat unit working in
22 conjunction, keeping our community safe.
23 Your dedication to public safety and your
24 swift response is the reason why Nassau
25 County is the safest county in America.

1
2 And I want to thank you as a Wantagh
3 resident, for all that you do for keeping
4 our Wantagh residents safe and our entire
5 county safe. Thank you and keep up the
6 great work.

7 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Yes, of
8 course.

9 MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON: I
10 also just want to recognize all of you.
11 You guys are sort of our unsung heroes.
12 So many things that you take care of
13 don't get as much publicity as they
14 should. And we just want to take this
15 moment to thank you not only for this
16 instance, but all those times that you
17 put the extra effort in.

18 And our fire marshal has done so
19 much. I'm so proud of you. Every time I
20 told you, every time I see you in the
21 news, you represent the County so well.
22 And you speak to people in a way they
23 understand and in a way that it really
24 makes a difference. So we're lucky to
25 have all of you.

1
2 And Kris Kalender, you do an amazing
3 job representing your team. I don't know
4 if they realize how hard you work, so
5 thank you.

6 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Would
7 you guys want to come for a picture?

8 (Whereupon, photos were taken.)
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2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. I'm
3 I'm told that we have a future legislator
4 down in the audience.

5 Legislator Drucker?

6 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: Thank you very
7 much, Presiding Officer. We are being
8 observed today by a very motivated and a
9 future political leader who, for unclear
10 reasons, has been a fan of mine for a few
11 years and has this unsatiated thirst for
12 Nassau politics, and has been dying to
13 attend a legislative session, and his
14 teacher is well aware of his passion and
15 has actually given him permission to take
16 the day off and attend. I just would like
17 to take a second, thank you, Presiding
18 Officer, to welcome our future leader,
19 who's 10-years-old, Adam Cass in the
20 fifth grade. Adam, why don't you just
21 stand up for a second (applause).

22 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Good luck,
23 Adam, but you want to do something better
24 than this, right (laughter)?

25 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: No. He doesn't.

Look at him. See? He's shaking his head.

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay, we
3 now move on. We had Women's History
4 Month, a little belated, but here we are,
5 due to snowstorms. We'll start off with
6 Legislator Goetz.

7 LEGISLATOR GOETZ: Hello again. So
8 today we are recognizing a truly
9 exceptional woman, Margaret Marchand, for
10 this Women's History month.

11 Margaret is a renowned advocate for
12 parental advocacy in education and a
13 champion for schools that prepare
14 students for success in the 21st century.
15 As president of the Locust Valley School
16 Board, she had kept families informed,
17 involved and empowered, always putting
18 students and parents first.

19 I know Margaret personally and her
20 leadership has made a real difference for
21 families like mine. In fact, her
22 leadership in the district was a driving
23 factor in our decision to make Locust
24 Valley our forever home. Her advocacy
25 gave many of us a voice and helped shape

1
2 decisions that strengthen our community.
3 She's a fierce advocate for our children,
4 and that was never more clear than when
5 she stood up in 2021, alone against her
6 board, against Governor Hochul's mandate
7 to reimpose masking mandates on students
8 after all, those requirements had already
9 been lifted at the state level. And while
10 others stayed silent, Margaret spoke out
11 forcefully, challenging the policy and
12 standing her ground in defense of parents
13 rights and children's well-being. She
14 made it clear that decisions impacting
15 our children should not come from Albany
16 mandates, but from the families and
17 communities that they directly affect.
18 That leadership meant a great deal to
19 families like mine as well.

20 Margaret is also a champion of civic
21 education and patriotism. Through her
22 operation, democracy and the Remembrance
23 Bowl, she helps students connect with
24 history in meaningful ways. She has also
25 helped revive the spirit of Operation

1
2 Democracy, a grassroots effort that began
3 in 1947 when Locust Valley residents
4 supported the people -- and forgive me
5 because I do not speak well with French,
6 but Saint-Mere-Eglise, in Normandy after
7 World War II, turning that legacy into a
8 living, hands-on lesson in service,
9 gratitude and global connection for
10 today's students.

11 She's a loving mother, a woman of
12 deep faith. Recently her sons have been
13 engaged -- I think one might even be
14 here. So congratulations.

15 In Bayville and throughout the
16 Locust Valley School District, Margaret
17 is a force to be reckoned with. She is
18 now head of school at Holy Holy Child
19 Academy in Old Westbury, and she's
20 already making an impact in many, many
21 ways. But just recently we had a ribbon
22 cutting and the incredible transformation
23 of the library that she was a integral
24 part of making happen.

25 Margaret stands up for what is

1
2 right, even when it's not easy. She's
3 been pivotal in empowering school boards
4 across New York State to know their
5 rights, making it clear that local boards
6 know their communities best, and they are
7 elected to serve the families in their
8 communities.

9 She's been a leading voice in
10 protecting local control and ensuring
11 communities are not overrun by one size
12 fits all policies.

13 Her impact is felt far and wide, and
14 it is a privilege to recognize her today
15 as a Woman of Distinction. Please join us
16 if you have a few words to say at the
17 podium.

18 MS. MERCHAND: How are you? Good
19 afternoon. It is an absolute honor to be
20 here. Samantha, thank you so much for
21 nominating me.

22 It is something that, I'm sitting
23 here watching the Police go before me and
24 I'm saying, what am I doing next to them?
25 Because basically what I do every day

1
2 just comes from my heart. I believe that
3 every child deserves the right for a free
4 and fair education, and I believe that
5 every child's parents have the right to
6 rear those children the way that they see
7 fit. Not according to the government.

8 I'm now in the private sector and
9 I'm seeing a whole different perspective.
10 But at the end of the day, children just
11 deserve a really sound, rigorous academic
12 foundation where they can find purpose
13 and they can be future leaders like our
14 little friend in the audience.

15 And I thank you for this honor, but
16 I'm humbled, but thank you. Thank you so
17 much.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: And
19 Margaret, why don't you just come up and
20 bring your family to come on up for a
21 picture?

22 (Whereupon, photos were taken.)
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2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator
3 Russell?

4 LEGISLATOR RUSSELL: So we have
5 another honoree that I am so very proud
6 to honor this afternoon. And her name is
7 Mrs. Shirley Darkay. Mrs. Darkay is a
8 wife, mother, artist, curator,
9 entrepreneur, poet, and a lifelong
10 community advocate whose work spans more
11 than six decades of cultural leadership,
12 innovation, and service. Her life
13 reflects a deep commitment to preserving
14 African American history, empowering
15 future generations and strengthening
16 community institutions across Long Island
17 and beyond.

18 Shirley is a lifelong resident of
19 the Village of Westbury. She and her
20 husband George Kamala Darkay, now
21 deceased, are the proud parents of three
22 children and two grandchildren.

23 A trailblazer in both the corporate
24 and public sectors, Mrs. Darkay was the
25 first African American woman to work in

1
2 the accounting department of the Federal
3 Reserve Bank of New York, and later
4 served as Comptroller for Reed Roberts
5 Incorporated.

6 Her pioneering spirit continued in
7 1966, when she became the founding
8 director of Management Information at the
9 Charles Drew Neighborhood Health Center,
10 where she designed and implemented one of
11 the nation's earliest computerized
12 patient identification and billing
13 systems, an achievement well ahead of its
14 time. For more than 45 years, Mrs. Darkay
15 has dedicated herself to cultural
16 preservation, public service and
17 educational outreach. She is a former
18 director of the Nassau County African
19 American Museum and a lifetime host of
20 community news and views on WHLI radio
21 platforms, which she amplified African
22 American voices, history and civic
23 engagement.

24 In 1990, she founded Project Pride,
25 a cultural based self-development program

1
2 for youth in the Nassau County Family
3 Court system, serving as executive
4 director and mentor to countless young
5 people.

6 Her extensive board service reflects
7 a sustained commitment to arts education
8 and community development. Mrs. Darkay
9 has served on boards of directors for
10 Nassau County Girl Scouts; Nassau County
11 Office of Cultural Development; Alliance
12 for New York State Arts Council; African
13 American Heritage Association; Newsday;
14 Long Island Arts; 100 black women and
15 others. She has held leadership roles,
16 including board chair for Imani at Nassau
17 Community College treasurer for Jack and
18 Jill of America and member of Black Women
19 Entrepreneurs.

20 Most recently, she served as a
21 trustee of the Westbury Memorial Library
22 from 2020 to 2023, continuing her
23 lifelong advocacy for libraries as a
24 vital center of learning, history and
25 community connection.

1
2 Though officially retired since
3 2003, Mrs. Darkay remains deeply engaged
4 in community life. She conducts African
5 American history workshops for school
6 districts and libraries across Long
7 Island. Volunteers at the Westbury Senior
8 Center, where she chaired its 60th
9 anniversary celebration and produced a
10 fashion show featuring her own original
11 designs.

12 She is also a member of Sisters of
13 the Arts, NSQ, supporting young people
14 pursuing creative careers, and was a
15 contestant in the 2016 New York, Miss
16 Senior America.

17 Mrs. Darkay's lifelong service has
18 been recognized with numerous honors and
19 awards. Through her leadership and
20 creativity and unwavering dedication,
21 Mrs. Darkay has built a legacy rooted in
22 service, cultural preservation, and
23 community empowerment, one that continues
24 to inspire across generations.

25 At the age of 91, and she doesn't

1
2 mind me telling her age, at the age of
3 91, she recently curated and created an
4 exhibit embodying the spirit of Homegrown
5 Heroes of Long Island, a woman whose
6 legacy was not imported but cultivated,
7 whose impact was not distant, but deeply
8 rooted, and whose lifelong work continues
9 to shape the cultural landscape of the
10 community she calls home.

11 I present to everyone Mrs. Shirley
12 Darkay (applause).

13 MS. DARKAY: Good afternoon. I want
14 to give thanks to God first, and I
15 appreciate all of the legislators who are
16 here. Most of all, my legislator, Ms.
17 Vivian Russell. And I want to say that no
18 matter what stage of life you're in, you
19 can still do something for your
20 community.

21 Today, our history is being erased.
22 And I happen to be an advocate for
23 African American history. And as long as
24 I have a voice, I will speak to that
25 issue because our young people need to

1
2 know their history. Without knowing your
3 history, you don't know where you belong
4 and where you can can achieve and where
5 God will take you. Thank you very much
6 for the opportunity.

7 LEGISLATOR RUSSELL: Mrs. Darkay, can
8 you join us up here for a picture? And if
9 you can, bring your family and friends
10 that came along to support you today as
11 well.

12 (Whereupon, photos were taken.)
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2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: All right.

3 We now proceed to a period of public
4 comment, and that's a period during which
5 members of the public -- you know
6 something? We have a couple of points of
7 personal privilege first.

8 Fine. Legislator Walker, why don't
9 you go ahead?

10 LEGISLATOR WALKER: It is truly an
11 honor for me to recognize a gentleman who
12 has worked for 58.5 years in the Nassau
13 County Department of Health, and his name
14 is Michael Alarkin.

15 Michael, could you stand?

16 Michael Alarkin, director of the
17 Bureau of Environmental Engineering and
18 Water Supply at the Nassau County
19 Department of Health, has retired after
20 58.5 years of extraordinary service. His
21 tremendous dedication to Nassau County
22 has helped safeguard the health, safety
23 and environmental well-being of
24 generations of families.

25 Upon his retirement, he concluded

1
2 his career as the longest serving
3 employee in Nassau County government.
4 Michael joined the department in 1967.
5 Over the decades, his work has helped
6 protect Nassau County's most vital
7 natural resource, our sole source
8 aquifer, which provides drinking water to
9 millions of Long Islanders. His
10 leadership contributed to regional water
11 protection planning efforts following the
12 Federal Water Pollution Control Act
13 amendments and helped shape long term
14 groundwater protection strategies for our
15 county.

16 He played a role in the Long Island
17 Comprehensive Water Treatment Management
18 Plan and later coauthored work addressing
19 the protection of the Lloyd aquifer,
20 reinforcing Nassau County's commitment to
21 preserving groundwater for future
22 generations.

23 Throughout his career, he oversaw
24 critical environmental engineering
25 functions including public supply

1
2 oversight, toxic and hazardous chemical
3 storage review, onsite sanitary disposal
4 systems, and environmental assessments
5 for residential development. He is
6 nationally recognized for his expertise
7 and leadership, earning two model
8 practice awards from the National
9 Association of City and County Health
10 Officials for innovative environmental
11 protection initiatives.

12 Michael's career reflects
13 consistency, professionalism, integrity
14 and an unwavering sense of
15 responsibility. Beyond his individual
16 accomplishments, he has provided
17 stability, mentorship and institutional
18 knowledge to this department for nearly
19 six decades. His commitment has
20 strengthened the Nassau County Department
21 of Health and protected the well-being of
22 our community for generations.

23 Fifty eight years of service is not
24 simply a milestone, it is a legacy. On
25 behalf of the Nassau County Legislature

1
2 and the residents of Nassau County, we
3 extend our deepest gratitude for your
4 extraordinary commitment. We thank you
5 for your service, your leadership, and
6 the remarkable example you have set for
7 all who follow.

8 After nearly six decades of service,
9 may your retirement be as rewarding as
10 the career you have given to Nassau
11 County. God bless you, Michael, and thank
12 you so very much.

13 MR. ALARKIN: Oh, wow. Thank you so
14 much. This is a tremendous honor to be
15 here. I loved your statement, and I
16 can't -- was that me? Really? You were
17 talking about? No. I know I look over
18 100-years-old, but I'm actually just a
19 little bit, maybe over 50; is that right?

20 But it has been a great honor to
21 work for the department for these so many
22 years and working with our water
23 suppliers and other environmentalists to
24 protect our water resources and our
25 drinking water supply. So I just want to

1
2 thank everybody for being here. And I'm
3 not sure who's watching the store today,
4 but thank you for all the staff that are
5 here today. Thank you so much.

6 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Michael, if you
7 would come up here and join us for a
8 photo.

9 (Whereupon, photos were taken.)

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2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator
3 Nicks?

4 LEGISLATOR NICKS: All right. So on
5 the afternoon of December 8, 2025, the
6 Uniondale Fire Department was dispatched
7 to reports of a working building fire at
8 886 Jerusalem Avenue. As the tone
9 sounded, firefighter Christopher Drummond
10 assumed the role of Officer in charge of
11 engine 7522, immediately stepping up to
12 lead his crew. Upon arrival, Firefighter
13 Drummond and the operating department
14 members wasted no time. He moved swiftly
15 to assist the first two engine, engine
16 753 and establishing a hand line. And
17 when conditions demanded more, he went
18 above and beyond. Faced with a structure
19 whose windows and doors were boarded and
20 inaccessible, firefighter Drummond, under
21 the direction of Chief Kevin Hicks and
22 Assistant Chief Joseph Rodriguez, made
23 the courageous decision to advance to the
24 roof and gain entry from above to begin
25 interior operations. What happens next

1
2 speaks to the character of Mr. Drummond.
3 Once inside the smoke filled structure
4 presumed to be vacant, firefighter
5 Drummond and Chief Rodriguez heard
6 something that no one anticipated.
7 Screams coming from deep within the
8 interior. Without hesitation, they
9 advance into the structure and located an
10 adult male occupant who was conscious but
11 severely disoriented and in desperate
12 need of assistance. With decisive
13 action, firefighter Drummond, along with
14 Assistant Chief Rodriguez, guided the
15 victim to safety and physically removed
16 him from the building. But their work
17 didn't stop there. With the coordination
18 and professionalism of truck four engines
19 two and three operating on the scene. The
20 victim was transferred to the awaiting
21 fast team for evacuation off of the roof.
22 A seamless effort that was made possible
23 by the dedication of every firefighter
24 and EMS member that day. Once the victim
25 was confirmed safe, Firefighter Drummond

1
2 reentered the structure alongside his
3 crew to knock down the remaining fire
4 load. This outcome, a life saved, is a
5 testament not only to Firefighter
6 Drummond's bravery and instinct, but to
7 the collective strength of the men and
8 women of the Uniondale Fire Department
9 who operated with excellence under
10 pressure.

11 To everyone who responded that day,
12 your service does not go unnoticed. And
13 as we often say in the fire Mattyc world,
14 the only thing predictable about
15 firefighting is that it can become
16 unpredictable.

17 It is my distinct honor, as your
18 Legislator of Nassau County's Fifth
19 District, to recognize the fire
20 department and firefighter Christopher
21 Drummond as this month's personal point
22 of privilege.

23 MR. DRUMMOND: Good afternoon,
24 everybody. I would like to take this
25 moment to first and foremost, thank God.

1
2 I'd also like to thank all the members of
3 the legislature and then also thank my
4 department for choosing to recognize me.
5 This is a humbling experience as well as
6 anything else.

7 My service to this country as a
8 United States Army paratrooper in the
9 82nd Airborne Division. I learned about
10 two things. It's about adapting and
11 overcoming. And this is one of those days
12 that we did both. In the volunteer fire
13 service we don't have the we don't have
14 the luxury of having all the manpower
15 that we need at all times. And in a
16 situation that was unpredictable like
17 this, when we went to a fire and didn't
18 expect someone to be in there, we adapted
19 and overcame. With this team behind us.
20 We all trained together, we eat together,
21 we laugh together, and we share the same
22 pain, the same load together. That's what
23 we do as firefighters.

24 So again, I'd like to thank
25 everybody equally as anyone else. And

1
2 again, we don't see ourselves as heroes.
3 This is what we do. This is strictly
4 business for all of us. But thank you,
5 everyone.

6 LEGISLATOR NICKS: Chief, if you like
7 to bring the members up quickly.

8 (Whereupon, photos were taken.)

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2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Now we
3 finally reach our period of public
4 comment. That's when the public can come
5 up and voice his or her concerns. Just
6 want to remind everyone of what the rules
7 are. In case you don't know. The comment
8 for each person is three minutes. Really
9 three minutes. It's timed. You can see
10 the clock here. Make sure that you adhere
11 to that. You cannot see your time to
12 someone else. Each person gets three
13 minutes. The public comment period will
14 stop at 3:15. It's one hour. If there are
15 people who have not yet had a chance to
16 speak at that point they will be given a
17 chance following the business of the
18 legislature. In other words, we'll go to
19 our regular calendar and then after we're
20 finished with that, we'll come back. And
21 hear anyone who's remaining.

22 When I call your name, please come
23 right up. And remember, if you go longer
24 than that or you try to go longer than
25 that, you will not be granted additional

1
2 time and you will be taking time from
3 someone else. Let's start off with
4 Paulette Orlando.

5 MS. ORLANDO: Good afternoon. My name
6 is Paulette Orlando with Tobacco Action
7 Coalition of Long Island. Although the
8 Clean Indoor Air Act protects New Yorkers
9 from exposure to second hand smoke in all
10 indoor public spaces and work sites,
11 millions of nonsmokers continue to be
12 exposed to second hand smoke in areas not
13 covered by smoke free laws or policies,
14 including the very homes where they live.
15 In fact, the home is the primary source
16 of secondhand smoke exposure for children
17 and a major source of exposure for
18 nonsmoking adults. As a community
19 engagement specialist working for the
20 American Lung Association's Tobacco
21 Action Coalition of Long Island, I've
22 spoken to many tenants living in
23 multi-unit housing that are experiencing
24 these harmful effects of secondhand
25 smoke. Older adults with chronic

1
2 obstructive pulmonary disease, COPD, and
3 other respiratory issues. Many tenants
4 that call me in desperation are afraid to
5 leave their name, or are afraid to speak
6 out because of the repercussions they may
7 experience. For residents of multi-unit
8 housing in apartment buildings and
9 condominiums, second hand smoke can be a
10 major concern. Even if people don't smoke
11 in your unit, as smoke can migrate from
12 other units and common areas and travel
13 through doorways, cracks and walls,
14 electrical lines, plumbing and
15 ventilation systems. In a study of
16 multi-unit housing residents in New York
17 state, 73% of residents did not allow
18 smoking in their units, but 46%
19 experienced secondhand smoke infiltration
20 from other units during the past year.
21 Essentially, if one person smokes in the
22 building, everyone smokes. Secondhand
23 smoke exposure poses serious health
24 threats to both children and adults, such
25 as heart disease, lung cancer,

1
2 respiratory infections, stroke and
3 asthma. More than 3,000 nonsmoking adults
4 in New York state die from diseases
5 including heart disease, lung cancer, and
6 stroke caused by secondhand smoke every
7 year. Children are especially vulnerable
8 to the health effects of secondhand
9 smoke, given their developing bodies and
10 lungs. Children exposed to secondhand
11 smoke are at increased risk of sudden
12 infant death syndrome, ear infections,
13 asthma and respiratory infections caused
14 by second hand smoke every year.

15 Secondhand smoke exposure in
16 multi-unit housing also contributes to
17 disparities in health. This same
18 population has a higher prevalence of
19 asthma, COPD and other health conditions,
20 worsened by exposure to secondhand smoke.
21 More than two in five nonsmokers who live
22 below the poverty level are exposed to
23 secondhand smoke, and nearly 7 million
24 multi-unit housing residents live in
25 subsidized public housing.

1
2 Approximately 65% of smokers say
3 they would like to quit smoking. We know
4 smoke-free housing helps to support
5 adults that are trying to quit smoking or
6 have quit smoking.

7 Lastly, everyone should be able to
8 breathe freely in their homes. Thank you.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Thank
10 you. Larry Lamendola?

11 MR. LAMENDOLA: For the new members
12 of the legislature that have not seen my
13 daughter's picture. Ms Knight, we've met.
14 This is my daughter, Ms. Russell. This is
15 my daughter. I found her lifeless body in
16 her room on September 19, 2019, just days
17 after her 25th birthday. Gone. Fentanyl
18 poisoning.

19 So today is the third time I'm
20 speaking. I found out on this past
21 Thursday, some rather disturbing news.
22 I've been crying out for the opioid
23 settlement money. All of it, to be put
24 forth, used. Took a long time for the
25 portal to be opened. It's open, I believe

1
2 May of last year, those nonprofits that
3 have been able to apply have applied.
4 There should be more. In light of the
5 fact that Medicaid has been decimated,
6 there are those in recovery who need the
7 money. This is a lifeboat. I've spoken
8 about this since March of this year
9 stating this has got to be done. The
10 disturbing news I want to reveal today.

11 I was made aware that \$13.7 million
12 of the interest from the opioid
13 settlement, Nassau County, was put into
14 the Nassau County General Fund. This is
15 disturbing. This is beyond belief for me.
16 I don't like it. That money should not be
17 earmarked, not \$0.01, for anything else.
18 For use, for the county.

19 This is blood money. This is money
20 that should be spent on people in
21 recovery, education, and prevention.
22 Period. Full stop.

23 I'm disturbed each time I think
24 about this. When I found out about it on
25 Thursday, I had a couple of sleepless

1
2 nights, to tell you the God's honest
3 truth. I went to my daughter's grave on
4 Friday. I went to my daughter's grave on
5 Saturday. I don't want one person to die
6 from Fentanyl again. Please do the right
7 thing. This is not political, ladies and
8 gentlemen. Thank you very much.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Susan
10 Gottehrer.

11 MS. GOTTEHRER: I invite everybody to
12 lay flowers, please.

13 Good afternoon. My name is Susan
14 Gottehrer the director of the Nassau
15 County, New York Civil Liberties Union in
16 Nassau. I'm here today to mark the six
17 months since Santos Banegas-Reyes died at
18 the Nassau County Jail.

19 As a veteran advocate around the
20 Nassau County Jail, I'm distressed and
21 disturbed to report that when I heard the
22 news, I was not surprised. Not exactly
23 sure where to start. So I'll start with
24 this county's wholesale and shameless
25 adoption of Trump's inhumane immigration

1
2 policies and the values they convey. Not
3 just the policies, the values. A warm and
4 willing embrace of the cruelty and lies
5 that underpin those policies. And the
6 most dangerous and insidious lie of all,
7 that this is about public safety. It is
8 not, and it never was. You have two 287-G
9 agreements and an exam with the jail to
10 lend out beds for ICE detainees.

11 Police commissioners know that
12 crimes go down when their department can
13 be trusted by the public. Well, right
14 now, this entire government can't be
15 trusted. Why? Because you've said loud
16 and clear with these agreements that you
17 are on board with the cruelty and
18 arbitrary lawlessness of ICE and the
19 Trump Administration. This is not about
20 public safety. We have boots on the
21 ground watching as people get taken off
22 the streets every day in Hempstead,
23 Freeport, Uniondale, Roosevelt, Westbury.
24 This is not about public safety.

25 One of my neighbor's sons has a

1
2 friend, an American citizen who has been
3 stopped and detained twice in Hempstead.
4 Walking to work. A citizen. This is not
5 about public safety.

6 The truth is that immigrant
7 communities have the lowest rates of
8 crimes of all the demographics, and they
9 contribute enormously to our society.
10 This is not about public safety.

11 We want a full and truthful report
12 about the death of Santos Banegas-Reyes.
13 Raise your hand if anybody has called the
14 family to wish them condolences. Anybody?
15 Thank you.

16 And to bring it even further, the
17 Public Safety Committee must exercise
18 oversight of the jail. The air
19 conditioning has been on at the Nassau
20 County jail since November on and off.
21 This is human rights violations. Please
22 do your jobs and inspect the jail. Please
23 issue a report. I am begging you.

24 And please stop colluding with ICE.
25 They are lawless and cruel. And that

1
2 means that you are, too. Immigrants are
3 not the cause for concern regarding
4 public safety. This government is. Thank
5 you.

6 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Claudia
7 Borecky.

8 MS. BORECKY: Hello. I'm executive
9 Director of the South Shore Women's
10 Alliance, and I am alarmed by County
11 Executive Blakeman stealing millions from
12 the Opioid Settlement Fund and his
13 refusal to release nearly \$100 million
14 that the County received in 2019. Funds
15 to save lives from opioid addiction. What
16 could be more despicable than siphoning
17 money away from people fighting for their
18 lives? The opioid fund is meant to
19 prevent addiction, to treat those already
20 struggling, and to reduce the deadly harm
21 caused by substance use.

22 The New York State Mental Hygiene
23 Law, Section 25.18, is explicit about how
24 these funds are to be spent. These
25 dollars were won through the suffering of

1
2 families who buried loved ones through
3 years of litigation meant to hold
4 pharmaceutical giants accountable. They
5 were never meant to become a slush fund
6 to paper over budget failures. Yet,
7 Blakeman has only managed to get 8.5% of
8 these life saving funds to the agencies
9 that actually prevent and treat opioid
10 addiction.

11 Worse still, the allegation that
12 millions were secretly diverted from the
13 opioid fund to mask a budget
14 mismanagement, it's not just a
15 bureaucratic failure, it is a moral one.
16 It violates state law and erodes the
17 trust of every family shattered by
18 addiction.

19 This pattern of neglect is not
20 isolated. Blakeman withheld critical
21 county funds from fire departments and
22 EMS services. The very first responders
23 who revive overdose victims and keep
24 communities safe.

25 His refusal to fund the Safe Center

1
2 forced the shutdown of Nassau's only
3 domestic violence center and the
4 legislature, you guys, refused to adopt
5 the Families Against Fentanyl Act, which
6 would have required Fentanyl Detecting
7 test strips and Narcan kits is yet
8 another failure to act to save lives.

9 Taken together, these decisions
10 paint a devastating picture. Blakeman is
11 failing to responsibly fund services that
12 save lives and every delay, every stolen
13 dollar, has a human cost. Families are
14 losing loved ones. Communities are
15 grieving losses that could have been
16 prevented. This is not just
17 mismanagement, it is a betrayal of the
18 people these funds were meant to protect.

19 We demand the immediate return of
20 all the monies taken from the opioid
21 fund. We also call for full transparency
22 into the opioid account and urge this
23 legislature to establish a citizens
24 advisory committee to ensure that these
25 funds are allocated swiftly and

1
2 appropriately. It is illegal to take
3 money out of opioid accounts to use for
4 other purposes. Blakeman must stop the
5 steal. Thank you.

6 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Dimitrios
7 Giouzepis, I hope I got that right.

8 MR. GIOUZEPIIS: I've had the
9 opportunity of speaking before this panel
10 on several occasions. Good afternoon,
11 esteemed members of the legislature.

12 As you take a moment to remember, a
13 year ago, I stood before you and shared a
14 story set in the future. It was the story
15 of a young child whose life was
16 transformed because this body chose to
17 invest in preschool special education and
18 related services. I asked you then to
19 imagine what becomes possible when we
20 commit not just to beginning the work,
21 but to finishing it. I am here to remind
22 you of that story because we are now
23 living right in the middle of it. In that
24 story, I returned decades later as a
25 representative of a generation that

1
2 benefited directly from the decisions you
3 made in this room. I spoke of Thomas, a
4 little boy who faced early developmental
5 challenges and received timely speech and
6 occupational therapy through a preschool
7 special education program supported by
8 adequate sustainable funding, because
9 providers were able to remain in the
10 field and because new ones were drawn in,
11 Thomas received consistent, high quality
12 services at the most critical time in his
13 development.

14 And as you follow that story
15 forward, Thomas grew up. He built a
16 career. He raised a family, he became a
17 mentor and you can hear how his success
18 was not accidental. It was the direct and
19 predictable result of policy choices that
20 recognized early preschool services as
21 both a moral and fiscal imperative.

22 That future has not yet been fully
23 secured, and at the same time, you can
24 recognize that it is within reach.

25 Over the past year, you have taken

1
2 meaningful and commendable steps by
3 approving an increase to reimbursement
4 rates. Those actions mattered. They began
5 to address a decades old structural gap
6 that had been steadily eroding the
7 preschool special education system. They
8 slowed the loss of experienced providers.
9 They sent a clear message that this work
10 the professionals who do it and the
11 children for whom we work are valued. And
12 yet, as we all know, beginning the work
13 is different from completing it. We are
14 still in the chapter where the outcome
15 depends on consistency and follow
16 through. Until reimbursement rates fully
17 reflect the true cost of delivering high
18 quality services, the field remains
19 vulnerable. Providers will continue to
20 struggle to recruit and retain staff.
21 Programs will remain at risk in children
22 whose developmental windows do not wait
23 will feel the consequences, and it's
24 useful to remember why the reimbursement
25 increases were applied in the first place

1
2 to attract new providers to the field, to
3 stabilize and grow programs, to ensure
4 access to services for every eligible
5 child, and ultimately to preserve the
6 system for future generations. That
7 purpose has not changed. And as you
8 consider it again now, you can clearly
9 see that the goal has not yet been met.

10 So today, I ask you to remember the
11 story you heard last year, not as a
12 hypothetical future, but as a
13 responsibility actively unfolding right
14 now. We ask that you continue applying
15 the increases until reimbursement rates
16 fully reflect the true cost of delivering
17 high quality services, a 10% increase
18 over the next five years. Suffolk County
19 has already done. Ensure that the story
20 we tell our future is one of commitment
21 and resolve, not merely unfinished
22 intention. The children we serve today
23 will never know the names of the budget
24 lines or policy debates, and yet they
25 will live with the results for the rest

1
2 of their lives.

3 The future depends on what we do
4 today. Thank you for your continued
5 leadership, your commitment, and your
6 willingness to finish what we so
7 importantly began.

8 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Jodi
9 Hawkins.

10 MS. HAWKINS: Good afternoon. My name
11 is Jodi Hawkins and I've been a therapist
12 providing services to preschool children
13 for the past 20 years. I would first like
14 to express my appreciation for the recent
15 increase in reimbursement rates, which is
16 an important and much needed first step.
17 However, there is no current guarantee of
18 future increases, leaving providers
19 without long term financial stability.
20 Living and working on Long Island, where
21 the cost of living is exceptionally high,
22 continues to place significant financial
23 pressure on providers. While the demand
24 for therapy services remains strong,
25 current reimbursement rate makes it

1
2 increasingly difficult to sustain a long
3 term career in this field. Many of my
4 colleagues have already left, or are in
5 the process of leaving, due to the
6 combination of excessive paperwork
7 requirements, limited compensation, and
8 the high cost of living. These growing
9 workforce shortages directly impact the
10 availability of services for children who
11 need them the most. In addition, many
12 preschool therapists are traveling
13 providers who service multiple locations
14 each day, incurring substantial
15 out-of-pocket expenses for fuel, vehicle
16 maintenance, and unpaid travel time.
17 Reimbursement rates have not kept pace
18 with the inflation or the true cost of
19 delivering services.

20 Most therapists are reimbursed on a
21 fee for service basis, which limits
22 income stability and does not account for
23 essential non-billable work, such as
24 documentation, travel, administration
25 responsibilities. As a result, providers

1
2 routinely work far beyond their direct
3 service hours without fair compensation.

4 Furthermore, under part 200 of New
5 York State regulations, providers are
6 required to attend meetings including
7 initial eligibility meetings, annual
8 review meetings, and program reviews
9 without reimbursement. In order to
10 comply, therapists often must cancel
11 multiple paid sessions resulting in
12 further financial loss.

13 Providing services at the preschool
14 level not only improves outcome for
15 children, but also reduces long term
16 financial burdens on school districts.
17 Research consistently shows that early
18 intervention can prevent the need for
19 more intensive and costly services later.
20 In fact, every dollar invested in early
21 childhood intervention yields significant
22 savings in the future educational costs.
23 Despite these well-documented benefits,
24 it's becoming increasingly difficult to
25 sustain preschool level services under

1
2 the current reimbursement structure.

3 I respectfully urge you to consider
4 implementing regular cost of living based
5 reimbursement increases, as well as
6 compensation for mandated non-billable
7 responsibilities. These changes are
8 essential to stabilizing the workforce
9 and ensuring that children continue to
10 receive timely, high quality services
11 during these critical years. Thank you
12 for your time.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Monica
14 Nichols.

15 MS. NICHOLS: Good afternoon. I'm
16 speaking today as a mother of a special
17 needs child. Imagine being a parent who
18 has just had their child diagnosed and
19 evaluated and is told for the very first
20 time that their son or daughter has a
21 disability or developmental delay. It's
22 overwhelming, emotional, and frightening.

23 Now imagine being told that your
24 child needs therapy, but there are no
25 providers available to begin services. No

1
2 support, no start date. Just waiting.

3 That reality is unimaginable for
4 families, and yet it happens every day.
5 Preschool related services are not
6 optional. They are time sensitive.
7 They're critical and they are life
8 changing. The earlier we intervene, the
9 better the outcomes for children and
10 family.

11 I want to thank Nassau County for
12 helping to move the needle in increasing
13 rates for related services providers.
14 Raising rates will directly impact
15 getting providers back and getting
16 children the services that they need.
17 Suffolk County has increased and is at
18 the same rate as Nassau County. However,
19 they have committed to a 10% increase
20 each year for five years to bring us in
21 line with the rates of other counties of
22 New York. It is essential that Nassau
23 does the same.

24 I want to acknowledge the progress
25 that has been made. Families feel it. It

1
2 matters. We still have work to do, but we
3 are moving in the right direction and
4 that gives parents hope. Thank you.

5 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: David
6 Tellerman.

7 MR. TELLERMAN: Hello, everybody. I
8 am David Tellerman and I am the director
9 at New York Therapy. So we are an agency
10 that provides special education services
11 to children throughout Nassau County. And
12 I'm here today to speak specifically
13 about preschool related services. So
14 these services are speech therapy,
15 occupational therapy, physical therapy
16 for children ages three to five years
17 old.

18 Many of you have heard us speak on
19 this topic in previous meetings, and I
20 have also had the pleasure of meeting
21 with some of you individually. For those
22 of you who may not be familiar with the
23 work that we've done, I'd like to briefly
24 provide some background for you. For
25 several years, hundreds of children and

1
2 their families have not received a
3 legally mandated services to which they
4 are entitled. The primary reason for this
5 is that the reimbursement rates remained
6 unchanged for 27 years. As a result, many
7 therapists were forced to leave the field
8 for positions such as hospitals, skilled
9 nursing facilities or other settings
10 where they can earn a sustainable salary
11 to support their families. Because of the
12 shortage, children either went without
13 services entirely, or waited several
14 months for services to begin. Imagine
15 receiving the devastating news that your
16 child has a disability and requires
17 intervention, only to be told that no
18 providers are available.

19 During this time, Nassau County had
20 the lowest reimbursement rate in the
21 state. Today, I'm here to thank all of
22 you for your support because the tide is
23 finally turning. With your help, we have
24 increased the reimbursement rate from a
25 low of \$40 per session to \$55 per

1
2 session. This is a significant and
3 important first step.

4 However, the average reimbursement
5 rate across New York State is near \$65
6 per session, with several counties paying
7 over \$70 and some reaching as high as \$80
8 reimbursement. The current rate of 55 is
9 still near the bottom of the list of all
10 62 counties.

11 As grateful as we are, 27 years of
12 no rate movement is a lot to make up for.
13 I would like to share with you that
14 Suffolk County Executive's Office, has
15 recognized this crisis and they have
16 actually taken action. So we've been
17 promised for a 10% increase each year for
18 five years, which equates to
19 approximately a \$5 increase per session
20 annually. We are expecting our second
21 increase of the five years this coming
22 July 1st. This plan will bring Suffolk
23 County in line with the reimbursement
24 rates across the rest of the state. We're
25 asking for Nassau County to implement the

1
2 same future increases. With these future
3 increases, there is no doubt that
4 therapists will return to the field. This
5 will allow us to achieve our shared goal,
6 ensuring that all preschool children
7 received a special education services
8 that are so critical to their
9 development.

10 It's widely understood that for the
11 first few years of development that is
12 essential for brain skill acquisition. So
13 thank you again and we appreciate your
14 time.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Cheryl
16 Keshner, please.

17 MS. KESHNER: Good afternoon. My name
18 is Cheryl Kushner. I'm with the Long
19 Island Immigrant Justice Alliance and the
20 Long Island Language Advocates Coalition.
21 I'm here today to call for justice for
22 Santos Banegas-Reyes and for all the
23 immigrants who are being demonized by
24 this administration and terrorized.

25 It's been six months since Santos

1
2 Banegas-Reyes died in the Nassau County
3 Jail, and still we have not gotten a full
4 report regarding what led to that death.
5 What were the circumstances? The Nassau
6 County Medical Examiner, as well as
7 Homeland Security, owe that to the
8 community and to especially to Santos'
9 family. So we are calling for justice and
10 a full investigation.

11 Secondly, we'd like you to
12 investigate the conditions at the Nassau
13 County Jail, as was stated before. We
14 have heard from many people that the
15 conditions there are deplorable, that it
16 is freezing, that people are being denied
17 food and water, or if they are given
18 food, it is moldy. They are not given
19 access to phones to contact legal counsel
20 or their families, and they are kept in
21 their cells 23 hours a day. This needs to
22 be investigated. This needs to be
23 stopped. This isn't Louisiana or Texas.
24 This is here, right here in Nassau
25 County. We need an end to Nassau's

1
2 collusion with ICE.

3 As you know, there are 287-G
4 agreements, which permit the Police to
5 act as ICE agents and which allow the
6 jail to be used to detain people for ICE.
7 Nassau should not be playing any role in
8 this horrible, terrible treatment of our
9 neighbors, our brothers and sisters.

10 And I want to thank those of you,
11 the legislators who have spoken up, who
12 recently sent a letter. We saw it. We
13 appreciate it, but more needs to be done.
14 It's not enough. We don't need just a
15 temporary end of 287-G agreements. We
16 need it to be eliminated. And Nassau
17 should not be colluding in any way.

18 We also know that probation is
19 turning people over to ICE when they are
20 reporting, as required by law, to comply
21 with what's court mandated, and then
22 probation is turning them over. They're
23 being separated from their families when
24 they're just trying to do the right
25 thing.

1
2 So when you say this is the safest
3 county, I do take issue with that. I
4 think many of us do. This is not the
5 safest county in New York if you're
6 black, if you're brown, if you're Latino,
7 if you're an immigrant. It's not the
8 safest county If you're a student in
9 Roosevelt trying to get your diploma and
10 you're torn away from your family. It's
11 not the safest county if you're a father
12 going out to buy baby formula, and then
13 you're taken by the Nassau County Police
14 Department and turned over by ICE. It's
15 not the safest county if you're trying to
16 take your kid to school, and then you
17 find that you're taken and your kid is
18 waiting for you to come and pick them up.

19 So please don't just spout rhetoric.
20 Do something. We need a safe county for
21 everybody who lives here, not just a
22 select few. Thank you.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Fred
24 Brewington?

25 MR. BREWINGTON: So first of all, I

1
2 greet you all and say thank you for
3 giving honor to God.

4 First, I come with you with six
5 points. One on September 18, 2025, six
6 months ago, Mr. Reyes died. He died in
7 our hands, the hands of each of you who
8 legislate this county and have
9 responsibility to speak and report to the
10 public. He died in the hands of Nassau
11 County. We need to take responsibility
12 for that to him and to his family and to
13 the community. When we don't, we fail
14 each other. We turn our backs on each
15 other, and that's not something that's
16 acceptable.

17 Point two, question, any contact
18 with the family? I know one of my
19 brothers over here did. Reached out to
20 the family to say, we send our
21 condolences. And I'm asking now for
22 legislation from this body, particularly
23 from the Majority -- and I'm going to
24 speak largely to this side of the room.
25 So please excuse me -- that you put

1
2 legislation on for Nassau County that one
3 of you come up with a bill that says
4 anybody that dies in custody at the
5 Nassau County Jail gets a letter from you
6 saying whether or not it's our
7 responsibility or fault or not, we send
8 our condolences and God be with you.
9 That's the common and decent thing to do.
10 You do it for a lot of other folks, but
11 you don't do it for people that die in
12 the jail when they could be falsely
13 accused or inappropriately there, just
14 like Mr. Reyes was.

15 Three, we sent to you on October 13,
16 2025, a letter asking for each one of you
17 to respond to us about his death and
18 about what was going on in the jail. We
19 got crickets, except for a Legislator
20 Nicks, who wrote on behalf of several of
21 her colleagues. I know you got it because
22 we got the response that said that you
23 got it. That's not acceptable. You turned
24 your backs on many people from the
25 organizations called TCC, Long Island

1
2 advocates for Police accountability. Long
3 Island United, and a number of people
4 that are here for.

5 Fifth, majority you supplied -- we
6 ask you that if no one likes being
7 ignored, and particularly the family of
8 this gentleman that is here. No one likes
9 being ignored.

10 In my last 30s, let me say this.
11 There are 13 people that died in Nassau
12 County's jail. This is a report from the
13 New York State Commission on Corrections.
14 I'm going to give it to Ms. Nicks because
15 she's been the most responsive.

16 But at this particular point, I'm
17 just going to say we need to be
18 responsive, because what you have done is
19 a bad demonstration. This is the
20 demonstration. I'll ask you to stand you
21 and turn your backs on them.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Thank
23 you.

24 Frankie Lozada.

25 MR. LOZADA: Hello, everyone. My name

1
2 is Frankie Lozada. I'm here because a
3 member of my community is no longer with
4 us. I'm here because politicians decided
5 to blame the consequences of their
6 mistakes and decisions and their mistakes
7 of their governance on some of the most
8 vulnerable communities in this country.

9 For months, we've watched from afar,
10 while federal agents have ripped families
11 apart and removed some of our hardest
12 working community members, and now
13 they're here in our backyard.

14 Santos Banegas-Reyes is just one
15 name, but he represents all the lives
16 that have lost at the hands of ICE. I
17 spent nearly two years of my life working
18 with families and unaccompanied minors at
19 the Mexican border. I saw firsthand the
20 treatment that these individuals
21 received. But most importantly, I heard
22 their stories. These are families that
23 are escaping hardship and fear. Imagine
24 that. They come here for safety. They
25 come here for opportunity, and for a

1
2 second chance at life, chasing the same
3 American dream that was promised to us.

4 In 2021, I started advocating for
5 New York for all. And now, five years
6 later, everything that we've been warning
7 about is coming true. Had we had been
8 heard from our legislators, Santos
9 Banegas-Reyes would still be here today.
10 And I am asking for a full and
11 transparent investigation of his case.

12 In the meantime, my question is how
13 many more of my community members have to
14 die? How many more before legislators
15 take action? How many more families have
16 to grieve? I'm tired of people who look
17 like me and sound like me being targeted
18 and attacked. All for the purpose of
19 political division. We are human beings,
20 not political pawns. And I'm asking for
21 our legislators to have compassion, to
22 have reason to honor righteousness and to
23 pass New York for all. And for the New
24 York, the Nassau County legislators to
25 demand that law enforcement honor their

1
2 role and commitments to protect and serve
3 and stop collusion with ICE. Thank you.

4 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Richard
5 Clolery.

6 MR. CLOLERY: Hello again, everyone.
7 Here we go. To the members of the
8 Legislature, there's going to be a TAC
9 meeting this week. As a member, I will
10 fight to increase funds so we can
11 increase bus service here so people can
12 get around Nassau County safely.

13 Before I go, there are two things I
14 want to talk about. As I go along
15 Hempstead Turnpike. I pass by a fenced
16 off spot on Newbridge Road. It's just a
17 little bit before Hempstead Turnpike,
18 actually. That says no trespassing or
19 litter because of state law. Let me tell
20 you, it's an illegal junk yard right now.
21 We need to do something about this
22 because I am not sure what it's for, but
23 people are illegally dumping their trash
24 at these locations without fear of
25 consequences because there's no one

1
2 monitoring these spots. I mean, who wants
3 to pass by a junkyard? Anyone? Thank you.

4 Occasionally, I have to come here by
5 AbleRide because it rains or snows. I was
6 wondering if I could be dropped off in
7 the back. I know it's for the staff, but
8 there is no safe spot to drop me off or
9 other disabled people to come here to
10 speak.

11 I'm also worried about what's going
12 on in this country due to the actions of
13 President Trump and the Republican/MAGA
14 Party. We need to come together this
15 Saturday to protest against the evils
16 caused by these people.

17 I look forward to the No Kings
18 Protest this Saturday in Mineola.

19 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Susan
20 Steinmann?

21 MS. STEINMANN: Hi. My name is Susan
22 Steinmann. I wanted to respond to
23 something that was said by one of the
24 other speakers that the lowest community
25 in terms of demographic and statistical

1
2 research that has crime are immigrant
3 communities. And yet, why do so many
4 people associate immigrants with
5 criminality? It's because if a lie is
6 told over and over and over again, it
7 will be believed. This is an old game. So
8 because of this and because of the plans
9 of division, in order to get elected,
10 which is why this was done, to turn one
11 part of our populace against the other
12 for crass political reasons, large
13 sections of our communities are being
14 hunted by bounty hunters. They're being
15 snatched. We have little children in
16 Dilley Detention Center, two of whom have
17 died already. Take a look. Go to your
18 internet and take a look at the faces of
19 these little children. These little
20 children were writing letters outside as
21 to what they were going through, and the
22 answer of the Homeland Security people
23 was to go into their cells, take their
24 crowns, take their pencils, take their
25 paper, rip their drawings off the walls

1
2 so they could not communicate with
3 anybody.

4 I mean, this is not the America that
5 I grew up in at all. We know that our
6 history has some really terrible things
7 in it, regardless of the attempt to
8 whitewash our history into a fantasy land
9 that never existed. We know the history
10 of how the indigenous people were
11 treated. We know the history of slavery
12 and no amount of taking things out of the
13 Smithsonian Institute will erase that.
14 But we have to look at our history if we
15 want to do a better job being Americans.

16 I want to mention a poem at the base
17 of the Statue of Liberty. Give me your
18 tired, your poor, your huddled masses
19 yearning to breathe free, the wretched
20 refuse of your teeming shore. Send these,
21 the homeless tempest tossed to me. I lift
22 my lamp beside the golden door.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Thank
24 you. Mary Ann Ojeda.

25 MS. OJEDA: Good afternoon. That's a

1
2 tough act to follow. My name is Mary Anne
3 Ojeda. I'm the director of the Solidarity
4 Group. We're a nonprofit based out of
5 Freeport, New York.

6 To continue with today's theme for
7 Nassau County to continue being the
8 safest county in the United States, ICE
9 needs to stop. It needs to get out of
10 here. Harassing and using unlawful tax
11 tactics aimed towards the Latino
12 community. We are a tax paying community.
13 We are small business owners and the
14 immigrant workers that keeps everything
15 rolling.

16 Safe? Victim of domestic violence
17 cannot feel safe and is not safe. If he
18 or she cannot call the Police for fear of
19 being deported.

20 And I'm calling to all of you to
21 please get ICE out of our communities is
22 destroying our small business owners.
23 Thank you.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: All right.
25 This is Mother Marie Tatro.

1
2 MS. TATRO: I'd like to use the first
3 few moments of my time to observe a brief
4 silence as we honor the life of Santos
5 Banegas-Reyes. I will then pray some
6 words from my tradition.

7 Into your hands, Oh, loving God, we
8 commend your servant Santos. Acknowledge,
9 we humbly beseech you, a sheep of your
10 own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a
11 sinner of your own redeeming. Receive him
12 into the arms of your mercy, into the
13 blessed rest of everlasting peace, and
14 into the glorious company of the saints
15 in light.

16 Almighty God, father of mercies and
17 giver of comfort, deal graciously. We
18 pray with all who mourn, especially the
19 friends and loved ones of Santos. May
20 they feel your love, knowing that they
21 may cast all their care upon you, Oh,
22 God, and may they know the consolation of
23 your love.

24 And we pray for all who have died
25 while in the custody of the state, for

1
2 their loved ones and for all the
3 disappeared. May they come to know that
4 your love and grace is far more powerful
5 than the Empire, and will outlast the
6 evil that is in our midst, and let all of
7 them know that they are not only loved by
8 you, God, but by us, their fellow
9 travelers in this life, and that we will
10 never stop fighting for their freedom and
11 their right to live in peace.

12 We commend to Almighty God our
13 brother Santos, earth to earth, ashes to
14 ashes, dust to dust. The Lord bless him
15 and keep him. The Lord make his face to
16 shine upon him and be gracious to him.
17 The Lord lift up his countenance upon
18 him, and give him peace.

19 And may we, the living, be to one
20 another a comfort in our afflictions, and
21 give each other the daily strength to
22 continue to do the work that you have
23 called us to do. Amen.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Chris
25 Jacobs?

1
2 MR. JACOBS: Good afternoon. Chris
3 Jacobs. Our Nassau County roads are
4 plagued with potholes, which are creating
5 hazardous driving conditions for our
6 county's residents. County motorists have
7 had to swerve in and out of other lanes,
8 panic break and even backup traffic flow
9 just to avoid them.

10 First, I want to thank Legislator
11 Russell and Legislator Nicks for the
12 expeditious response times and fixing
13 road issues I have conveyed to them
14 regarding roadways within their
15 respective legislative districts. Thank
16 you.

17 I understand that our county roads,
18 along with most of the roadways
19 throughout New York State, are
20 experiencing higher than normal amounts
21 of potholes due to the high volume of
22 snow we received this winter. The melting
23 and refreezing of snow due to fluctuating
24 temperatures, as well as extending
25 periods of subfreezing temperatures. My

1
2 point of contention is with the
3 inadequate repairs being done fixing the
4 potholes on our county roads, I travel
5 throughout the entirety of Nassau County
6 on a weekly basis. Often times I have
7 seen many potholes be filled in one day,
8 only to reopen themselves a few days
9 later. This is indicative of a
10 substandard road base as well as improper
11 road maintenance.

12 Another observation I witnessed is
13 that many potholes are filled, but not
14 compacted and leveled, leaving protruding
15 bumps in place of potholes, which are
16 just as dangerous for vehicles and
17 pedestrians.

18 Going forward, I hope the county as
19 a whole does a comprehensive look at the
20 structural integrity of our county roads.
21 Our county roads are heavily traveled by
22 well over 100,000 motor vehicles per day,
23 and are showing signs of wear and tear.
24 Road safety is paramount for the
25 residents of Nassau County and should be

1
2 everyone's number one priority. Have a
3 great afternoon.

4 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Nadia
5 Molina.

6 MS. MOLINA: Good afternoon. I'm here
7 on behalf of NDLO, which is the National
8 Day Laborer Organizing Network.

9 We're here today also to remember
10 and demand justice for Santos
11 Banegas-Reyes. We stand with his family
12 in Honduras and in Kentucky, and his ten
13 year old daughter, Santos, lived and
14 worked in Hempstead as a day laborer and
15 construction worker. For day laborers,
16 every day is a risky endeavor, with the
17 possibility of getting a good job or a
18 dangerous one, or a job where your
19 employer is going to steal your wages.
20 And meanwhile, day laborers are building
21 the economy like Santos did renovating
22 homes, repairing roofs, trimming trees
23 all over Long Island.

24 In Hempstead, a black and brown
25 community, ICE has been racially

1
2 profiling, questioning and arresting
3 people on the street.

4 According to ICE's own report.
5 Santos was arrested there on September
6 17, 2025, and died in less than 24 hours
7 by 6:30 a.m. on September 18th. ICE
8 claims that this was due to alcohol
9 withdrawal, but if that is true, or if
10 that were true, there's no indication
11 that he was checked every hour as would
12 be done with somebody who is undergoing
13 alcohol withdrawal. It would be required.
14 It seems that Santos was denied needed
15 medical care, which is why we are
16 demanding the release of the Nassau
17 County Medical Examiner's report and the
18 New York State Attorney General's report.
19 ICE also said in their report that Santos
20 crossed the border multiple times as a
21 way of making him sound like a bad guy, I
22 think. But to me, this is an indication
23 of deep familial love and sacrifice.

24 I saw Father's Day graphic which
25 said my father would cross 100 borders to

1
2 give me a better life, and I think that
3 Santos would have crossed the border 100
4 more times to protect his family, to
5 contribute to his family, to see his
6 family or to visit or to be with them. I
7 hope that each of us and each of you are
8 lucky enough to know someone like Santos,
9 someone who loves us enough to cross 100
10 or 1,000 borders for us. Just like Santos
11 loved his family.

12 We ask that you release the medical
13 examiner's report and end all collusion
14 with ICE. Protect your constituents.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Pearl
16 Jacobs?

17 MS. JACOBS: Pearl Jacobs, President
18 of Civic Association, Uniondale.

19 All too frequently, as I open the
20 morning paper, there are headlines
21 reporting on vehicle accidents the day
22 before, accidents that occurred
23 overnight. Sadly, many of these accidents
24 resulted in fatalities. As you are well
25 aware, accidents in Long Island are of

1
2 high concern. So much so that Newsday is
3 doing a year long exposé on Long Island's
4 dangerous roadways. Newsday found that
5 traffic fatalities in Nassau County rose
6 from 67 in 2024 to at least 78 last year,
7 according to data from Newsday's Fatality
8 Tracker. Long Island has had a higher
9 traffic fatality rate than the state, in
10 part due to heavy reliance on cars. A
11 rise in aggressive driving and roadway
12 designs that put pedestrians and cyclists
13 at risk.

14 New York City recorded 205 traffic
15 fatalities in 2025, marking the lowest
16 number of traffic deaths since record
17 keeping began in 1910. This total
18 represents a 19% decrease from the 253
19 deaths recorded in 2024, continuing a
20 downward trend driven by Vision Zero
21 initiatives in New York City.

22 I attended both of Newsday's
23 Dangerous Drivers forums in Melville
24 Melville last year. Both forms were very
25 well attended by residents from Nassau

1
2 County and Suffolk County. At these
3 meetings, residents spoke up concerning
4 the lack of action that is being
5 demonstrated by our lawmakers making
6 concerning Long Island's dangerous
7 roadways. At these meetings, it was
8 heartbreaking to listen to the stories
9 shared by families that have lost loved
10 ones as a result of reckless and drunk
11 driving.

12 I have spoken before this
13 legislative body twice before advocating
14 for safer roadways in Nassau County. I
15 spoke regarding the Vision Zero
16 initiative in New York City that has
17 proven to save lives. The data tells the
18 story. More people are losing their lives
19 to vehicle fatalities than to gun
20 violence.

21 Our law enforcement Officers are
22 losing their lives in record by reckless
23 and inebricated drivers. We are fortunate
24 to be protected by one of the best Police
25 Departments in the nation. We can all

1
2 agree that our Police risk their lives
3 every day serving and protecting.

4 Residents of Nassau County Police have
5 families to go home to.

6 Also, it is unjust not to assist our
7 Police by utilizing technology that would
8 make their jobs safer and save lives as
9 well.

10 Legislator Nicks, thank you for
11 taking time to speak with me last week
12 concerning the speeding, reckless driving
13 and noise from the racing vehicles that
14 occur overnight on Jerusalem Avenue, a
15 roadway of death where camera technology
16 is desperately needed. And I would like
17 to thank state Assemblywoman Solages. She
18 has introduced a bill to designate the
19 Southern State Parkway, a highway safety
20 corridor, a concept used in other states
21 allowing for increased fines, more
22 patrolling, signage and speed cameras
23 which are otherwise allowed to --

24 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Meredith
25 Mereday.

1
2 MS. MEREDAY: During my moment of
3 silence before the clock ticks for Robert
4 Mueller, who was a Bronze Star awardee
5 and a decorated veteran with a Purple
6 Heart.

7 I stand before you today beyond
8 disgusted. With regard to the conduct in
9 general and the fact that again, our
10 freedom of speech is continually
11 curtailed, particularly in this body. And
12 largely I feel it's directed at me. The
13 fact that I'm one of the few who attends
14 these meetings, whether it's the
15 committee meetings or it's the full
16 legislator meeting. And to now this year,
17 not be able to comment on issues that are
18 brought before this body except prior to
19 a public comment. It smacks in the face
20 of the precedents that were established
21 and the fact that we have an open
22 meetings law. How can the public be fully
23 advised to address the issues that we pay
24 \$4.4 billion in taxes if we're not
25 allowed to get the information, but we

1
2 have to speak about it ahead of time?

3 I do have intuitive properties, but
4 not to the extent of how despicable some
5 of the decisions and the distribution of
6 our funds as addressed earlier today,
7 Opioid being one of them. I know on my
8 paper, so I'm not chastised about not
9 addressing the issue that was on the
10 agenda, the stop DWI fund, since Long
11 Island has the largest number of stop DWI
12 traffic ticket infractions, Suffolk
13 County only beats us with the number of
14 fatalities, but we have the largest
15 number. But we're funding a stop DWI
16 Program that when I was here two weeks
17 ago, when the funds were allocated, did
18 not know what department it was going to
19 because the public comment session was
20 before the actual hearing, not one of you
21 asked a question about where exactly
22 those stop DWI funds are going. Where's
23 the reporting? What is actually
24 happening? That's a disgrace.

25 Lastly, we pay more money in a \$300

1
2 million litigation unit that we pay for
3 veteran services, for minority affairs.
4 For social systems that are helping our
5 seniors, our veterans, our seniors and
6 our young people are the highest in the
7 suicide rates as we speak. This is
8 despicable. This is disgusting. And the
9 fact that you want to take your pictures
10 earlier and make sure you want to update
11 your websites to get reelected. At this
12 point, all of you should be voted out.
13 Those of you who say nothing and those of
14 you who don't have the capacity to do
15 anything. Now, I have to leave now and
16 get back to addressing the issues of
17 veterans who are losing their lives and
18 losing their homes, as well as losing
19 their health care and have to pay more
20 for prescription medication every week. I
21 am working with a critical care physician
22 in Queens to try to keep a senior citizen
23 from having to pay \$1,400 to just have
24 diabetes his medication. I'm disgusted.
25 And I'm done.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. This
concludes our public comment.

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PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Mr.
Pulitzer, would you please call the roll
for the Legislature?

CLERK PULITZER: Presiding Officer

24 LEGISLATOR MULE: Presiding Officer?
25 Before we do that, can I just because I'm

1
2 not sure where else I can say this, so I
3 just want to ask a question, please?

4 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Ask a
5 question of whom?

6 LEGISLATOR MULE: Is there a
7 representative from the county executive
8 here?

9 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: I'm sorry.
10 What is it that you're?

11 LEGISLATOR MULE: We have asked on
12 the record for projections and real
13 numbers regarding the VSIP. And we
14 haven't gotten any of it. And so I'm
15 requesting, again, to know how many
16 people have left? How many people are
17 being on hold? And what the plan for
18 backfill is? Chris is not here.

19 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: I assume
20 that the administration definitely has
21 represented here, and they've heard that.
22 And I guess you'll you'll take that back
23 and see what you can do.

24 LEGISLATOR MULE: Yeah. We need that
25 information. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Understood.

Okay.

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Those items

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Now we
3 have two hearings on the calendar today.

4 First hearing is calendar Item 1,
5 which is Clerk Item 34-26, which is a
6 local law to establish a partial
7 exemption from taxation for the surviving
8 spouses of volunteer firefighters and
9 volunteer ambulance workers killed in the
10 line of duty.

11 Motion to open the hearing by Deputy
12 Presiding Officer McKevitt. Seconded by
13 Minority Leader Deriggi-Whitton.

14 All those in favor of opening the
15 hearing say aye.

16 (Whereupon, all members
17 respond in favor.)

18 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Opposed?

19 (Whereupon, no response.)

20 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The hearing
21 is now open. Do we have anyone who wishes
22 to speak on this matter?

23 Legislator Strauss?

24 LEGISLATOR STRAUSS: Thank you,
25 Presiding Officer. This relief is for our

1
2 volunteer firefighters and EMS workers
3 who are killed in the line of duty. I
4 hope you notice that one very important
5 word, 'volunteer'. Our communities are
6 predominantly protected by volunteer
7 firefighters. The men and women of our
8 volunteer fire departments and ambulance
9 companies go through a tremendous amount
10 of training year round, and they
11 literally risk their lives each and every
12 day for us. We've all seen the pictures
13 and the videos of horrific fires and
14 vehicle crashes. The brave men and women
15 in those pictures and videos are
16 volunteers. We watched as they fight
17 their way into a house or building that
18 is fully engulfed in fire, with
19 temperatures reaching 1,000 degrees or
20 more. They're volunteers. They don't
21 receive a paycheck, yet they risk their
22 lives for us for free, just as the
23 firefighters did from Uniondale Fire
24 Department who were recognized here
25 earlier this afternoon. This relief will

1
2 honor their lives, their dedication,
3 their commitment, and their sacrifice.

4 Although this incredibly small
5 gesture will never make up for their
6 loss, it will make the lives of their
7 loved ones left behind a little easier.

8 As the an ex chief and still a very
9 active volunteer firefighter in my
10 community, I am extremely honored and
11 proud to support this piece of
12 legislation.

13 Thank you, Presiding Officer.

14 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you.
15 Is there anyone else? Minority leader?

16 MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON: Of
17 course, we fully support this, but there
18 were a couple technical questions that
19 we've already received in our Offices,
20 such as how to apply if there's a form,
21 and things like that.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Should
23 someone qualify?

24 MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON:
25 Should someone qualify, like what steps

1
2 should be taken and what if there's a
3 form that's already provided. I think
4 that we need to update the website with
5 this information, also. I guess the
6 administration's not here today, but we
7 could use some guidance about that.

8 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Yes. I
9 think those are all interesting and valid
10 points. And once we pass this item, which
11 hopefully will right away, presumably the
12 administration will go ahead and address
13 those things.

14 Is there anyone here from
15 assessment? Mr. Ross?

16 MR. ROSS: Good afternoon, Daniel
17 Ross, Department of Assessment. In
18 relation to your questions, we are
19 awaiting guidance from New York State and
20 as soon as applications are available,
21 they will be updated on our website and
22 made available to the public. But right
23 now, we don't have anything from New York
24 State.

25 MINORITY LEADER DERIGGI-WHITTON: As

1
2 always, we just ask that you keep us
3 advised, which sure would be nice. Thank
4 you.

5 MR. ROSS: You're welcome.

6 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any members
7 of the public wish to be heard on this
8 item?

9 (Whereupon, no response.)

10 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay.
11 Deputy Presiding Officer McKevitt moves
12 to close the hearing. And Minority Leader
13 Deriggi-Whitton seconds the motion.

14 All those in favor of closing the
15 hearing say Aye.

16 (Whereupon, all members
17 respond in favor by saying
18 Aye.)

19 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Opposed?

20 (Whereupon, no response.)

21 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The hearing
22 is now closed.

23 Now, we're going to take a vote on
24 this item, which is calendar item three,
25 Clerk item 34 of '26.

Once again, motion made by Deputy
McKevitt, seconded by Minority Leader
Deriggi-Whitton.

All those in favor of this item say
Aye.

(Whereupon, all members
respond in favor by saying
Aye.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Opposed?

(Whereupon, no response.)

PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. The
item passes unanimously.

Thank you, everyone.

1
2 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: We have
3 one another hearing, which is Calendar
4 Item 2, Clerk Item 44, which is to
5 prohibit the sale of nitrous oxide
6 whipped cream chargers in Nassau County,
7 except for businesses with appropriate
8 food sale permits or licenses.

9 Motion to open the hearing by Deputy
10 Presiding Officer McKevitt, seconded by
11 Minority Leader Deriggi-Whitton.

12 All those in favor of opening this
13 hearing say Aye.

14 (Whereupon, all members
15 respond in favor.)

16 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Opposed?

17 (Whereupon, no response.)

18 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: All right.
19 The hearing is now open.

20 We'll start out with a statement by
21 Legislator Walker.

22 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you,
23 Presiding Officer. I had provided a
24 rather lengthy statement at committees
25 and will not take up a great deal of time

1
2 here because we have a few speakers on
3 this item, but I did want to reiterate a
4 few points for the record. The motivation
5 for this proposed local law was the
6 result of a meeting that I had with
7 Central Nassau Guidance Center and the
8 mother of a young man, now passed, that
9 was able to obtain and abuse nitrous
10 oxide gas. The current New York state law
11 makes it illegal to use nitrous oxide gas
12 for the purposes of intoxication. State
13 law also prohibits its sale at retail to
14 the public and its use to limited
15 industrial, medical, and dental
16 applications. Nitrous oxide does have
17 another legitimate use that New York
18 State has recognized it is a culinary
19 use; whereby, the gas is used to create a
20 whipped cream. Recognizing that nitrous
21 oxide is used in this fashion, there is
22 an exception in state law that allows the
23 sale of nitrous oxide gas containers in
24 the form of whipped cream chargers.

25 As we discussed in committees, these

1
2 pressurized containers can be sold to
3 anyone over the age of 21 and are being
4 sold in various flavors like cotton
5 candy, strawberry, mango, raspberry and
6 many others. Retailers are not even
7 required to check ID if the purchaser
8 looks over age 25.

9 In addition, nitrous oxide is also
10 being sold in larger volume containers
11 that far exceed what would reasonably be
12 used to make whipped cream. What really
13 got my attention is how and where these
14 items are being sold. In my own district,
15 these canisters, supposedly to be sold to
16 chefs, restaurants, and bakeries, are
17 used to make whipped cream, are being
18 sold at smoke shops. I am not a home
19 chef, but if I were, I would not be going
20 to a smoke shop to obtain ingredients.

21 The FDA has issued a public health
22 advisory warning about nitrous oxide
23 abuse, and specifically on whipped cream
24 chargers, and has been educating on the
25 potential negative health impacts that

1
2 include abnormal blood counts, vitamin
3 B12 deficiency, loss of consciousness,
4 palpitations, psychiatric psychiatric
5 disturbances, including paranoia,
6 hallucinations, and depression. For some,
7 abuse can lead to prolonged neurological
8 effects, including spinal cord or brain
9 damage, even after stopping use. In some
10 cases, abuse will lead to death. We have
11 with us here today the mother of a young
12 man that unfortunately slipped into
13 addiction and nitrous oxide abuse. We
14 also have representatives of CNN guidance
15 who helped bring this problem to our
16 attention and for which we are grateful.

17 Thank you, Howard.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. Thank
19 you. Commissioner Gelman?

20 MS. GELMAN: Good afternoon,
21 Presiding Officer, and members of the
22 legislature. I am here today in my
23 capacity as Commissioner of Health to
24 address a matter of significant public
25 health concern, the unregulated sale of

1
2 nitrous oxide canisters within Nassau
3 County. Thank you for the opportunity to
4 speak before you here today.

5 Nassau County Department of Health
6 primary mandate is to protect the health
7 and well-being of nearly 1.4 million of
8 our residents. With that said, the Nassau
9 County Department of Health strongly
10 supports this proposed legislation, which
11 takes a targeted and practical approach
12 to limiting access to nitrous oxide
13 canisters. While nitrous oxide has
14 legitimate uses, as you've heard
15 Legislator Walker mentioned, including
16 food preparation, this law appropriately
17 restricts sales to businesses that hold
18 valid food sale permits, helping ensure
19 these products are used as intended and
20 not diverted for misuse.

21 Nitrous oxide N2O, commonly known as
22 laughing gas, is a dissociative
23 anesthetic widely used in medical and
24 dental applications for sedation and pain
25 relief. It is legally used in industrial

1
2 settings primarily as an aerosol
3 propellant for food products such as
4 whipped cream. However, when inhaled
5 recreationally, a practice known as
6 huffing or whippets, it displaces oxygen
7 in the lungs and bloodstream and may lead
8 to severe complications and even death.
9 The high is intense, nearly
10 instantaneous, and dangerously brief,
11 which can lead individuals to repeatedly
12 inhale the gas in a short period of time,
13 increasing the risk of rapid oxygen
14 depletion and serious harm.
15 The misuse of nitrous oxide presents
16 serious and well-documented health risks.
17 Sudden displacement of oxygen can cause
18 immediate loss of consciousness,
19 seizures, and fatal cardiac arrhythmia
20 even in first time users. Repeated use
21 has been associated with significant
22 neurological damage, including nerve
23 injury and long term impairment.
24 As outlined in the legislation,
25 these health impacts are not theoretical.

1
2 They are already being observed and are
3 growing concern, particularly among
4 adolescents and young adults.

5 In recent years, we have also seen a
6 shift from traditional small chargers, as
7 was mentioned, about eight grams or so,
8 to larger canisters about 40 times the
9 usual culinary application size, further
10 increasing concern around accessibility
11 and misuse. This legislation closes a
12 critical gap by focusing on point of sale
13 and purchaser eligibility, by requiring
14 verification of a valid food sale permit
15 prior to purchase. It ensures that
16 nitrous oxide canisters are not sold in
17 settings or to individuals where there is
18 no legitimate purpose.

19 The Nassau County Department of
20 Health fully supports this measure as a
21 meaningful step to protect the health and
22 safety of Nassau County residents. Thank
23 you.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you.

25 Let's see. We have two members of the

1
2 public, Jeffrey Friedman.

3 MR. FREIDMAN: Good afternoon, and
4 thank you for the opportunity to speak
5 with you. My name is Jeffrey Friedman,
6 CEO of CN Guidance and Counseling
7 services, a behavioral health provider
8 serving individuals and families across
9 Nassau County.

10 We strongly support Local Law 4426,
11 the Nitrous Oxide Consumer Protection
12 Act. I'm not going to repeat some of the
13 things that we've heard already, but this
14 Consumer Protection Act closes the
15 loopholes that allows easy casual access
16 and gives the county stronger enforcement
17 tools so retailers are held accountable
18 when products are diverted for misuse. At
19 CN guidance, we see this issue not as an
20 abstract policy problem, but as a problem
21 that's ravaging our young adults, our
22 clinicians, crisis team, and emergency
23 partners are increasingly encountering
24 individuals who present in acute
25 psychotic states or medical crises using

1
2 nitrous oxide products, products that
3 were never intended for inhalation. These
4 are not recreational side effects. They
5 are neurological symptoms, loss of
6 consciousness, severe anxiety, paranoia,
7 cognitive impairment, and they place
8 people and families in immediate danger.
9 The consequences of misuse are not
10 theoretical. Symptoms can mimic
11 psychosis, intense depression, or worsen
12 existing mental health conditions, often
13 making nitric oxide use go undetected. It
14 makes stabilization harder and recovery
15 longer. Families are frightened.
16 Emergency services are strained, and
17 clinicians are forced to respond after
18 harm has already occurred.

19 Local Law 4426 addresses the problem
20 of ease of access by ensuring they are
21 sold only to legitimate permitted food
22 businesses. Fewer people reach crisis
23 means, fewer emergency interventions,
24 fewer hospitalizations and fewer long
25 term neurologic and psychiatric

1
2 consequences. The legislation this
3 legislation will directly affect hundreds
4 of lives throughout Nassau County, not
5 the ones that who might just misuse the
6 products, but the parents, siblings, and
7 caregivers who end up navigating a crisis
8 that could be prevented.

9 We commend Legislative Walker and
10 the co-sponsors for acting decisively and
11 responsibly. This bill will save lives,
12 reduce suffering and make Nassau County
13 safer and healthier for everyone. Thank
14 you.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you.

16 Hayley Brown?

17 MS. BROWN: Good afternoon, and thank
18 you for allowing me to speak today about
19 the dangers of nitrous oxide and to share
20 my story of my son, Nima.

21 Nima was a wonderful soul, athletic,
22 artistic, and full of kindness. His
23 struggle with addiction began at age 14,
24 starting with marijuana and progressed to
25 harder substances. For years, he fought

1
2 to get well, going in and out of rehab.
3 But in March of 2024, I finally saw a
4 change in him. He was holding a job and
5 starting small aquarium business, and he
6 was going to his meeting and heading
7 towards sobriety. But sometime between
8 spring and early fall of 2024, Nima
9 discovered nitrous oxide. It's often
10 referred to as sober drug because it
11 doesn't show up in any of the drug
12 panels. In October 2024, Nima's behavior
13 changed rapidly. He became moody, then
14 deeply depressed, even while taking his
15 medication responsibly. He grew confused,
16 emotional and increasingly disconnected
17 from reality. He told me more than once
18 that life felt too overwhelming because
19 his drug tests were clean. We had no idea
20 Nitrous Oxide was harming him.

21 Physical symptoms soon followed sore
22 throat, headaches, nausea, vomiting,
23 numbness in hands and feet, and complete
24 loss of appetite. His condition worsened
25 into hallucinations and severe cognitive

1
2 decline. He began sharing stories that
3 never happened. Lost his sense of time
4 and place, and argued with therapists
5 that he cared for deeply. His skin grew
6 pale, his hands and feet were ice cold,
7 and he stopped showering and changing his
8 clothes. Eventually, he couldn't respond
9 to even simple questions. Nitrous oxide
10 depletes the body from vitamin B12 and
11 oxygen, causing nerve damage and
12 dangerous blood clots. This damage
13 progresses quickly and can be fatal.

14 On November 29, 2024, Nima lost that
15 battle. He died in his car right in front
16 of the smoke shop where he had purchased
17 the gas. He was just 34 years old. The
18 canisters were still beside him in the
19 car.

20 No parents should ever have to
21 experience that heartbreak. My mission
22 now is to make sure Nima's story protects
23 others. To ensure that his life, his
24 struggle, lead to greater awareness and
25 stronger safeguards around nitrous oxide.

1
2 By placing reasonable limits on sale and
3 use, we can prevent more families from
4 suffering the same tragedy.

5 Thank you again for taking up this
6 important legislation and for listening
7 to Nima's story.

8 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Condolences
9 from all of us here, certainly. And we
10 admire you stepping forward, it must be
11 very difficult for you to come forward
12 and talk about this. And we're going to
13 do what we can. Thank you.

14 MS. BROWN: Thank you very much.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Any other
16 members of the public? Legislator Mulé.

17 LEGISLATOR MULE: Yeah. Thank you,
18 Presiding Officer.

19 During this discussion, I decided to
20 see if this was available easily, like
21 through Amazon. And sure enough, it is.
22 So how do we stop that? How do we stop
23 people from being able to purchase it?

24 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: You can't
25 stop it even if it's coming from Queens

1
2 or from --

3 LEGISLATOR MULE: I understand that.
4 Is this just to stop --

5 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: We do what
6 we can.

7 LEGISLATOR MULE: Point of sale?

8 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: In other
9 words, we're limited. I mean, there are
10 many things like that. I've spoken about
11 it in our caucus. We have firecrackers,
12 illegal. They've been illegal forever.
13 You know any kids who can't get any?

14 LEGISLATOR MULE: Yeah. No, this is
15 not a criticism. It was a question. I was
16 wondering if this might address that in
17 some way.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Wish it
19 could. It's something that perhaps we,
20 everyone, should lobby the state and
21 federal government to regulate that.
22 That's where it needs to be done.

23 Okay. Any further debate or
24 discussion?

25 LEGISLATOR WALKER: I just wanted to

1
2 thank Dr. Freidman and Nima's mom for
3 coming here today. And thank you for all
4 you're doing to the other legislators. If
5 you have the opportunity, reach out to
6 Dr. Friedman and go see the Central
7 Nassau Crisis Center. It is totally
8 unbelievable. Legislator Drucker could
9 tell you.

10 LEGISLATOR DRUCKER: I will echo
11 Legislator Walker's comments. Jeff
12 Friedman, you do such an amazing job
13 there. It's the gold standard of
14 treatment and recovery. And all of us
15 here in the Legislature are so supportive
16 of everything CN and Guidance does, and
17 we'll continue to be that way.

18 LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you.

19 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Legislator
20 Pilip?

21 LEGISLATOR PILIP: Thank you,
22 Presiding Officer. All the people who's
23 involved are really trying to help our
24 community. Thank you. And especially
25 thank you for Nima's mom. It's

1
2 heartbreaking to hear your story, your
3 son's story. I mean, all of us feel the
4 pain. And I wish just to relate to
5 legislator if it was dependent on us, we
6 should stop any kind of drugs in our
7 country. Any type of drugs, including
8 marijuana and all this nonsense garbage
9 that we are selling in our state and
10 killing our children. I wish we can have
11 a power together. We'll do something to
12 stop this.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Thank you.
14 Legislator Pilip.

15 A motion to close the hearing, made
16 by Deputy Presiding Officer McKevitt.
17 Seconded by Minority Leader
18 Deriggi-Whitton.

19 All in favor of closing the hearing
20 say Aye.

21 (Whereupon, all members
22 respond in favor.)

23 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Opposed?

24 (Whereupon, no response.)

25 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: The hearing

1
2 is closed now on the item itself.

3 Calendar item for clerk item 44,
4 motion by Deputy Presiding Officer
5 McKevitt, seconded by Minority Leader
6 Deriggi-Whitton.

7 All those in favor of all those in
8 favor of this item say Aye.

9 (Whereupon, all members
10 respond in favor.)

11 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Opposed?

12 (Whereupon, no one responded.)

13 PRESIDING OFFICER KOPEL: Okay. That
14 item passes unanimously.

15 Thank you.

16 Now there is no further business. We
17 are done.

18 Motion to adjourn made by Deputy
19 Presiding Officer McKevitt. Seconded by
20 Minority Leader Deriggi-Whitton.
