    LEGISLATOR FORD: Good afternoon
    I am going to call the Public Safety Committee
    to order and ask the clerk to call the roll.
    MR. PULITZER: Thank you madam
    chairwoman. Public Safety Committee roll
    call. Debra Mule.
    LEGISLATOR MULE: Here.
    MR. PULITZER: Legislator Siela
    Bynoe.

MR. PULITZER: We have a quorum ma'am.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very much sir. There are seven items on the agenda today which are clerk item numbers 319-20, $328-20,329-20,334-20,338-20,341-20$ and 342-20.

Clerk item 319-20 is an ordinance supplemental to an appropriation ordinance in connection with the district attorney's office. I'm going to just go through the first one. May I have a motion? By Legislator Walker. Seconded by Legislator Rhoads. This item is before us. Good afternoon sir.

MR. MCMANUS: Bob McManus, district attorney. This grant was provided to the Nassau County District Attorney's Office

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by the United States Justice Department Office for Victims of Crime through the New York State Office of Victim Services. Funding will provide the formation of a new organizational unit called the Victims Services Unit. Direct services provided by the Victims Services Unit will focus on efforts that one, respond to the emotional, psychological or physical needs of crime victims. Two, help victims of crime to stabilize their lives after a victimization. Or three, to help victims to understand and participate in the criminal justice system. LEGISLATOR FORD: Actually, I'm really glad to hear about this. I think it will be something very key. So many people are traumatized as a result of being a victim of a crime. So, I guess this is just being started up at this point, right, and then you'll will see how to, maybe the DA will see how to staff it and what type of outreach that you'll have.

MR. MCMANUS: Yes. This grant will allow us to greatly increase our efforts in that area. We are very excited about it.

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LEGISLATOR FORD: You should be.
Any other legislators? Anyone from the public? No. Legislator Mule.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you. I too am really pleased to hear about this and I'm wondering what type of professional will you be using to staff it? Will it be psychologists, social workers or something else that I'm not thinking about at the moment?

MR. MCMANUS: The major staffing component will consist of individuals in a title called crime victims advocate, which is a competitive civil service title where the requirement is basically, the entry level requirement is basically a bachelor's degree. We also have at this particular time three certified social workers also working in the program.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Okay. So, will
the entry level people, because obviously you could have a bachelor's degree in anything but that wouldn't make you qualified to deal with victims of crimes. You certainly need to have

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training for that. What type of training would the beginner people be getting?

MR. MCMANUS: The people, the
individuals you referred to there has been an issue with the lack of experience. But we have provided extensive training to the people who are already on board and plan on doing so again with additional people that we plan to hire in 2021.

In terms of details regarding the training curriculum, I think I would prefer providing that to you and other members of the legislature in writing because $I$ was not directly involved in the training.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Okay. But just one further question with regards to that. Is there money in the budget for training?

MR. MCMANUS: Yes. The funding for the training is included in the grant budget. So, it's part of the grant and we do not have to use county funding for the training.

LEGISLATOR MULE: Thank you very much.

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LEGISLATOR FORD: I just have a question just to follow-up on that. Considering, because $I$ know that during the budget safety hearing, the public safety budget hearing, it was indicated that it's very hard for you to get DAs because the pay scale is so low and for other reasons. Is this pay going to be competitive so that we can attract people to come here and work?

MR. MCMANUS: In the crime
victims advocate?
LEGISLATOR FORD: Yes.
MR. MCMANUS: Due to changes that occurred over the years with the union contracts, CSEA contract, I can't help but be honest and say I feel the starting salary is very low. It's in the high 20s.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I guess that's something that has to be addressed. I know at civil service is there any age restrictions on this position? Say if you were retired, had been a DA and you realize retirement is not working out for you, like an ADA, just want to come back and work, can somebody say in their

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50s come back and work? Or 40 s or whatever? MR. MCMANUS: There's no question about it.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
much sir. Anyone else? Any public comment?
I see nobody. I would like to see if we could all -- who's in favor of passing item 319-20? All in favor say aye. Any opposed? The item passes unanimously. Thank you.

Clerk item numbers 328-20, 329-20, $341-20$ and 342-20 are ordinances supplemental to an appropriation ordinance in connection with the Office of Emergency Management.

May I have a motion. Moved by
Legislator Walker. Seconded by Legislator Rhoads. These items are before us. Good afternoon sir.

MR. DELANEY: Thomas Delaney, Nassau County Office of Emergency Management. The first item, 328-20, that's our emergency management performance grant. This is a FEMA grant passed through New York State Department of Homeland Security emergency services. That affords us the ability to fund

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our salary and fringe for some of our employees within our office. There's a 50 percent cost match on this which is funded by general funds. Again, with salary and fringe so it's in kind. LEGISLATOR FORD: Unless anyone has specific questions we'll just keep going and go back to any other questions, okay? So now it's 329, right?

MR. DELANEY: 329-20. This is also called the emergency management performance grant but it's suffix with a special. This is a one-time rollout from FEMA. Again, passed through New York State DHSES to allow us to purchase PPE that's outside of regular reimbursement channels. Right now FEMA has drawn that line in the sand since September 15 th saying that all PPEs must be bought for medical if you're going to get FEMA reimbursement on it. This goes beyond that.

LEGISLATOR FORD: This FEMA money has nothing to do with CARES Act through COVID-19, this is something separate?

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MR. DELANEY: Totally separate.
LEGISLATOR FORD: I think you
have 341.
MR. DELANEY: 341-20. This is called the public safety answering point grant. This grant is funded by New York State. It's not a federal grant. We use this to enhance the capabilities of our public service answering point. That is our 911 center fire com, med com. Got a wide array of investments we are allowed to make with this including purchasing furniture.

LEGISLATOR FORD: That's
interesting. How about 342 then?
MR. DELANEY: $342-20$ is our state Homeland Security grant award. This is a FEMA grant. Again, passed through New York State DHSES. As you can see on this there are multiple supplemental appropriations tied into this. So, with this funding we provide allocations for OEM and for the health department, for DPW and medical examiner's office. Everybody gets their own appropriations. They can make their own

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purchases. But the budgets are put upfront so that we know where the money is going to go and it's all approved by New York State.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
much. Any debate or discussion? Anything
from the legislators? Any public comment?
Legislator Walker.
LEGISLATOR WALKER: Just on clerk
item 342. Is each of those departments
allotted a certain amount or is it split equally?

MR. DELANEY: It's not split
equally. We look at it with our commissioner of our department as far as like how the best needs of the county are going to be met. I will tell you that OEM keeps a substantial amount on hand and that's so that when things pop up we are able to address them. That could be a purchase for the police
department. Those lines that you see out front if you came in the front entrance that money wasn't budgeted for the PD. We had it in our budget, we bought it for them.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: I had one

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other question as far as I think it was clerk item 329. How do we stand with all our PPE purchases? Do we feel we have plenty?

MR. DELANEY: We've got a very good stockpile that we built up in the very beginning of the incident. We have been drawing down as rapidly as we might have initially forecast on that. Again, we don't know where this disease is going to go. We are moving forward with continued procurement of PPE. Setting up a blanket order for the purchase of disinfectant wipes so that we can purchase them on a reoccurring basis and not on an emergency basis. Also setting up a blanket order for like face masks like I'm wearing now. The three-ply blue surgical masks. Again, set up as a blanket order so they're not emergency purchases.

The big thing with this though is that, like I said, after September 15th FEMA drew that line so that everything that's going to be federally reimbursable has to be a medical need.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: So by that

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you mean that either we're running low on particular items -- explain that to me, a medical need.

MR. DELANEY: If I have this face mask and I give this to somebody in EAB, emergency ambulance bureau, that's a medical need. If I take it and I give it to somebody in DPW it's not a medical need.

LEGISLATOR WALKER: It's really
who you give it to will make a difference if it's going to be any type of reimbursement?

MR. DELANEY: Correct.
LEGISLATOR WALKER: I'm sure
during the height of COVID we were, because we were desperate, we were spending a lot of money on equipment that now we can possibly save money, buy it at a more reasonable price because we're not in that utmost state of emergency and have to get it from where ever we can get it?

MR. DELANEY: That's correct.
LEGISLATOR WALKER: Thank you.
LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very
much. All those in favor of passing these

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items please signify by saying aye. Any opposed? The items pass unanimously. Thank you very much sir.

Clerk item number 334-20 is an ordinance supplemental to an appropriation ordinance in connection with the police department. The item is before us. Can I have a motion? Legislator Walker. Seconded by Legislator Bynoe. Who is here from the police department?

MR. FIELD: William Field, deputy inspector for the police department. Item 334-20 is a supplemental appropriation of $\$ 425,009$ in funds received from the United States Federal Emergency Management Agency, FEMA. This is an award of the COVID-19 assistance to fire fighters grant. The grant funding will be utilized to purchase PPE, personal protective equipment, to be used by members of the Nassau County Police Department Emergency Ambulance Bureau in their ongoing response to COVID-19. These supplemental appropriations have no net impact on the budget. The award does require a 15

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percent cash match.
LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you. Any of the legislators? Anyone from the public? I see none. May I have a motion to pass this item. All those in favor please signify by saying aye. Any nays? The item passes unanimously.

We now have clerk item 338-20 is an ordinance supplemental to an appropriation ordinance in connection with the emergency response department.

May I have a motion. Legislator Walker. Seconded by Legislator Bynoe. Who is here to speak on this?

MR. PERSICH: Andy Persich,
Office of Management and Budget. This item is appropriating the additional funds that we received from the CARES funding back in May. It's the second half of the second tranche of it. We did it in pieces because we weren't sure if the legislation was going to change, that it could be used for revenue offset. But as we sit here now we're getting close to the end of the year in order for me to make the

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LEGISLATOR FORD: Thank you very much. Any questions? I see none. All those in favor of passing this item please signify by saying yes. Any no's? The item passes unanimously.

Since we have an addendum, may I have a motion to suspend the rules. Legislator Ferretti. Seconded by Legislator Walker. Item number 346-20 is an ordinance supplemental to the annual appropriations ordinance in connection with the Office of Emergency Management, the correctional center and the fire commissioner and the police department. Who is here from the administration?

MR. DELANEY: Item 346-20 is for urban area security initiative grant. This is a grant that comes through FEMA and passed through New York State DHSES. We get the UASI grant because of our proximity to New York City. They're the primary beneficiary of it. But we get about two percent of that award.

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Again, it's similar to the state homeland security grant program I described before where we split the allocations with receiving departments. This one is used for our law enforcement agencies, the fire marshal gets some of it, PD gets some of it and as does the correction unit.

LEGISLATOR FORD: I don't have the summary, the whole thing on it but what is the amount of funding that we're receiving under this? Do you have that handy?

MR. DELANEY: Yes, I do. The total amount of the award is $\$ 2,649,658$. And contractually 25 percent of it has to go to law enforcement.

LEGISLATOR FORD: Any questions from the legislators? Public? I see none. May I have a motion to pass this item. All those in favor say aye. The item passes unanimously. We're finished. Thank you very much.

There's no other business before this committee. May $I$ have a motion to adjourn. Moved by Legislator

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DeRiggi-Whitton. Seconded by Legislator
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DeRiggi-Whitton. Seconded by Legislator Ferretti. All those in favor? This committee is now adjourned. Thank you very much. (Committee was adjourned at 2:47
